### THE HEN QUESTION.

Not in its relations to the McKinley or Wilson tariffs, but with respect to the comfort, convenience and respectability of Fredericton's sidewalks. The careless manner in which hens are permttted to run at large in this city is a positive disgrace, and it is quite time the municipal authorities framed a bye law to abate the nuisance. On St. John street the hens of half a dozen different people practically live on the street and sidewalks, and in many other sections of the city, the upper end of Charlotte street for instance, the abuse is quite as bad. The owners should have sufficient public spirit and decency to keep their broads on their premises when they can daily see the filth on the sidewalks, but we suppose only the law will compel them to do that.

### THEY NEED WATCHING.

The bicycling craze has reached Paris, and a French physician directs attention to the deaths of three persons from heart disease while bicycling. In Fredericton the bicyclists are not the ones to suffer from the sport, but the people they are likely to ride down on the sidewalks and at the crossings. The police authorities made a spurt a few weeks ago and fined some of the offenders, but the danger is just as great now as ever. A man or woman riding a bicycle has no more right on the sidewalk than a man or a woman driving a carriage. The bicyclists themselves ought to know that: doubtless they do know it, but they think they can trifle with the authorities. The most satisfactory feature of the new American tariff for Canada, at least, is the lumber schedule. The American market is practically thrown open to the Canadian lumbermen. The new schedule reads as follows:

Logs and round unmanufactured timber not specially enumerated or provided for Firewood, handle bolts, heading bolts,

stave bolts and shingle bolts, hop poles, fence posts, railroad ties, ship timber and ship planking, not specially provided for
