Prince Edward Island

Rules Relating to Private Bills. 36 All petitions for Private Bills must be presented within fourteen days after the commencement of the session exclusive of adjournment.

37 No Private Bill shall be brought into the House, but upon a petition first presented, truly stating the case at the peril of the suitors for such Bill, and such petition must be signed by the said parties.

38 A committee shall be appointed at the commencement of every Session consisting of five members of whom three shall be a quorum, to be denominated. The Private Bills Committee to whom shall be referred every Private Bill, and no proceedings shall be had thereon until they have reported thereon to the House.

39 So soon as the Committee has reported any Bill, such Bill together with any amendments that may be suggested by the Committee, shall be printed at the expense of the parties who are suitors for such Bill and printed copies thereof delivered to the members before the second reading of the Bill, if necessary by the Committee.

40 No Bill for the particular interest of any person or persons, Corporation or Corporations or body or bodies of people shall be read a second time until all fees be paid for the same into the hands of the Clerk of the House.

41 No Bill having for its object the vesting in or conferring upon any person or persons, Municipality or Body corporate, title to any tract of land shall be received or read in the House unless at least four weeks notice containing a full description of the land in question has been published in the Royal Gazette and one other newspaper in this Province of the intention of such Bill.

Land-Regulations

The sole head of a family of 1.5 male over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war and who has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.

When Dominion Lands are vested or posted for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive one day priority in applying for entry at local Agent's Office (not Sub-Agent). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent.

Holder of entries may count time of employment as farm laborers in Canada during 1917, as residence duties under certain conditions.

Glory To God! Peace To Man!

The unseen world thrilled at the birth of Jesus. Nothing is accomplished here below but what is decreed on high; terrestrial phenomena are the effects of heavenly and impenetrable causes; all the future, all the mystery of this cradle, were in the two words which was to fill space and time. Glory and Peace—glory to God, peace to man. Henceforward the earth, which knew not God, has a Son who was to teach us His name and establish His kingdom; mankind, given over to the brute law of destruction in her struggle for existence, was to know the law of peace, because she would be ruled by the law of love.

"And it came to pass, as the angels were gone away from them into heaven, the shepherds said one to another, Let us now go even unto Bethlehem, and see this thing which is come to pass, which the Lord hath made known unto us. And they came with haste, and found Mary and Joseph, and the Babe lying in a manger. And when they had seen it, they made known abroad, saying which was told them concerning this child."

The shepherds returned to their flocks and told the wondrous tale of what they had seen, glorifying and praising God. It does not seem, however, that the testimony of these poor people either stirred Bethlehem or troubled the peaceful lowliness of Jesus' cradle. He remained unknown with His Mother and Joseph, but Mary kept all these sayings in her heart; like all mothers, she made her memories a treasure, a sort of inward book, which she read over and over tenderly.

The field of the shepherds is still there; flocks feed in winter under the olives as in the days of Jesus, in the fields where the grass still grows green, and the anemones flower. Worship has never left the place where shone the brightness of the birthday lawn of Christ. On Christmas evening the people of Bethlehem flock to the Church of St. Helena, of which only the ruins remain, and in its desolate crypt they pray to the shepherds of Bet-Saur; their ancestors, who were the first apostles.

Clad in their long white veils, seated in groups on the broken walls, beneath the shade of the circling olives, the women, seen from afar, recall the mysterious beings who heralded the advent of Jesus. The crowd has an air of cheerfulness and calm, which harmonizes well with the memories of which the plain is full; and with that Eastern light which colors the whole and gives to the sterile rock itself an appearance of richness and of life.

The Good Saint

Twelve unusually large pearls and 193 other precious stones of great value have been pried from the encrustation of their setting on the coffin of St. Elizabeth of Hungary, "the greatest woman of the German Middle Ages," and taken by thieves who invaded the church which bears her name in Maribor, Jugó-Slavia. In addition to the jewels many costly robes were stolen.

The church was built in the thirteenth century and contains a beautiful shrine and sarcophagus of the saint whose name it bears. For the better part of the last six centuries, except when the Protestant Landgrave of Hesse, Philip the Magnanimous, interfered, this church has been constantly visited by pious pilgrims from all quarters of Europe.

St. Elizabeth was the wife of Ludwig, Landgrave of Thuringia, and for a time regent of Meissen and East Mark, who died while on a crusade to the Holy Land with Frederick II. Elizabeth died in November, 1231, and was canonized by Pope Gregory IX in 1235. Her remains were in 1249 placed in the church erected in her honor.

Need of Woman Doctor In India

The following letter was received from the Convent of the Holy Angels, Kumbakonam, Madras Presidency, S. India. It is dated July 29, 1920.

Reverend Father:
"Talyaray! Talyaray! day-
avu sai yungud! (Mother, Mo-
ther, have pity on us!) When
will your promise be fulfilled of
opening a hospital where we may
be nursed and treated? Look at
my weak state. I shall not live
if you refuse to take me in. Al-
yo!"

"Talyaray! my child is very
ill. The gods have not been able
to cure her. My only hope is in
you. Let her stay in your hos-
pital and she will soon run about
and be the joy of my life once
more. Have pity on her, Taly-
aray!"

Such are the clamors which
ring in our ears and sadden our
hearts, for owing to the want of
funds and the difficulty of finding
a woman doctor, we have not yet
been able to open our hospital for
women and children. Of late the
desires of the women of the dis-
trict are so imperative that they
arrive from long distances with
their bundles on their arms, crav-
ing admission to St. Ann's Hos-
pital for themselves or for some
sick relative or child. "Yenna
sai-gredu?" (What to do?) we
question sadly, and we watch
these poor pagan women to whom
we have consecrated our lives
turn very sorrowfully homewards
again.

Alas! as we look around us we
see many hospitals that are run
by American Protestants in India
and many thousands of dollars
are sent yearly for the main-
tenance of these up-to-date es-
tablishments. We may mention the
American Protestant Mission of
Mitraj, whose hospital is so much
appreciated by the people of the
Bombay Presidency, and their
hospitals for women at Nellore
and Madras, etc., etc., all equally
famed. This shows the value set
upon Medical Missions as instru-
ments of Christian propaganda.

We feel sure that Catholic Am-
ericans, whose missionary zeal
has now taken such a splendid
flight, will have the same gener-
osity in supporting a Catholic
scheme that has for its object
medical relief to pagan women
and children. Therefore we plead
today for:

1st. An offering from those
who love or bear the name of St.
Ann, Mary's gentle mother.

2nd. Hospital instruments, or
medicine, or babies of cotton wool
and cloth for bandages.

3rd. Lastly, a Lady Doctor, ca-
pable of and willing to devote
herself at least for several years
of her life, in the care of pagan
women and children. Will not
valiant soul arise and say: "Here
am I, Lord, take me."

"Oh! will no one hearken to the
cries of the pagan women of
Kumbakonam, who with out-
stretched, uplifted hands beseech
kind people across the seas to
hasten to their assistance by
opening the hospital of their
white Talyaras, where they may
be taken in and carefully tended?
We know that our appeal, made
in St. Ann's name, will not be
made in vain, and that through
the Propagation of the Faith
sisters, we shall receive the help
we so urgently need.

This was the first time in about five centuries that a king of Denmark has entered the Vatican. Christian, the first king of the Oldenburg family, was the last to come to Rome. This was in 1474. When Christian X, his descendant, entered the Vatican last week, he was received with great pomp.

The Pope also thanked King Christian for the help received from Denmark in obtaining from soviet Russia the release of Monsignor Ropp, Archbishop of Mohilev, in 1919.

An Historic Jewel

The late Empress Eugenie, a short time before her death, presented to the treasury of the Rheims Cathedral the magnificent jewel known as "Charlemagne's Reliquary." The imperial gift, which is now in the keeping of the Archbishop of Rheims, Cardinal Luçon, was found around the neck of Charlemagne, and given in 804 to Napoleon I, by the clergy of Aix la Chapelle. It is a round gold case, adorned with precious stones, and particularly with a splendid hollow blue sapphire, containing a relic of the true Cross. Emperor Napoleon III, for a long time kept the precious gem in his bedroom in the Tuileries, between portraits of King Louis and Queen Hortense.
