As was to be expected from the mechanical majority in the House of Commons. Hon, Edward Blake's amendment was defeated on a vote of 140 to 54. We see no victory in the result to the Government By voting against the amendment, and against the best interests of the Dominion, many of the members who sit to the right of the Speaker have sealed their political doom. The Cabinet has found the House with it, but the country is dead against them on this railway matter. A few hours before the vote was taken the Globe correspondent at Ottawa telegraphed as follows: 'It is not likely that on the defeat of the amendment, which is a foregone conclusion, the House will immediately concur in the resolutions, but a series of amendments will be offered with a view of securing the elimination of specific objectionable features in the contract, such as the exemption from municipal taxation, customs duties, etc., and the selection of the Union Pacific Railway as a standard for the Canadian Pacific Railway. The discussion of these amendments and the votes thereon will occupy a week, if not longer. The debate will be confined on each amendment to the subject specially covered by it."
