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Right Reverend Monsignor Browne PASSED PEACEFULLY AWAY.

His many friends in the city were grieved yesterday morning on coming abroad to learn that Rt. Rev. Monsignor Browne, P. P. of Grand River, St. George's, had died the previous night. Deceased came to the city about three weeks ago to attend the reception of the Papal Delegate and the consecration of His Lordship Bishop Power. He had not been in good health for about two years but bore his sufferings with perfect patience and resignation to the Will of the Almighty. He made a sacrifice, no doubt to come here to attend the consecration of Bishop Power. He was taken ill on that occasion and was obliged to leave the Church and retire to the home of Mr. V. P. Burke, Allandale Road, where he was staying and where he breathed his last sigh at 1 o'clock yesterday morning strengthened in soul by the last consoling rites of the Catholic Church. All day yesterday the body lay in state at the Mortuary Chapel, Belvidere, whence it was removed this morning to the Cathedral where Requiem High Mass was celebrated at 10 o'clock in presence of a large congregation. Interment took place shortly before noon at Belvidere in the plot assigned to the priests.

Monsignor Browne was in his 65th year, having been born in this city the year after the great fire that destroyed the city. His father was Mr. James Brown, a planter. The family removed to Harbor Grace in 1854 but returned to St. John's in 1865. Father Browne received his early training at the Old Orphan Asylum and at 17 entered the employ of the late M. Nolan, a city grocer. About five years afterwards he entered the office of the late Hon. L. O'Brien where he remained up to the closing days of the firm. During all this time he was noted for his zeal in the cause of religion and church work. He was an active member of the Christian Doctrine Society, and spent most of his time Sundays in the Cathedral.

In the year 1879 he resolved to study for the priesthood and began taking daily lessons in Latin, etc., from the late Rev. W. Fitzpatrick, the President of St. Bonaventure's College in 1881 he went to St. F. X. College, Antigonish, where he made a four year course. In 1885 he went to Montreal where he finished his theological course at the Grand Seminary in 1887. His Grace Archbishop Howley was then Vicar Apostolic of St. George's, and he was glad to get such an enthusiastic and pious worker on the West Coast mission as Father Browne. Four years after he was given the parish of St. Jacques, and in 1901 was appointed to the parish of Grand River. He was Vicar General of the Diocese of St. George's under Bishop McNeil.

The deceased was remarkable all through his life for gentleness and piety and good humour. He was withal an ardent worker in the cause of religion and education, and the imprint of his zeal and holy example will be found in the hearts of the rising generation of those parishes on the West Coast where he laboured. His only sister, Mrs. James Norris, of Highway Avenue, predeceased him last year, and he mourned her kind ministrations and hospitable care on coming to the city since her demise.

Daring Young Mariner SAILS FOR HUDSON BAY.

With Capt. W. H. Bartlett at the wheel, his young weather tanned face lighted up with reassuring smiles as he answered the fond adieux of the several friends who bade him adieu at the Torminus wharf, the topsail schooner Laddie set sail recently, bound on her long, lonesome voyage to Canada's northernmost port, Republic Bay, six hundred miles north of Fort Churchill, and 2,700 miles distant from North Sydney.

The Laddie was well loaded down with stores, provisions and portable houses, etc., for the Northwest Mounted Police in the bleak Hudson Bay outposts. She would have sailed earlier, but Capt. Bartlett decided that his ship would be the better of an overhauling on the marine railway here, and had new sheathing put on to withstand the constant contact of ice floes combatted in the frigid North. Besides her commander, the schooner carries seven men. On board are eighty barrels of kerosene oil, which will be used as motive fuel when the vessel is becalmed or encounters adverse winds.

Capt. Bartlett, who is only twenty-seven years of age, is the youngest mariner ever to go in charge of a vessel from these waters to the distant waters of Fort Churchill. It was this daring young native of Brigus, Nfld., who commanded the ill-fated schooner Jennie last year on a mission similar to the present one. On the return voyage the Jennie was caught in a bad gale and wrecked at a place called Wagner, the extreme northernmost part of the Hudson Bay.—Sydney Post.
