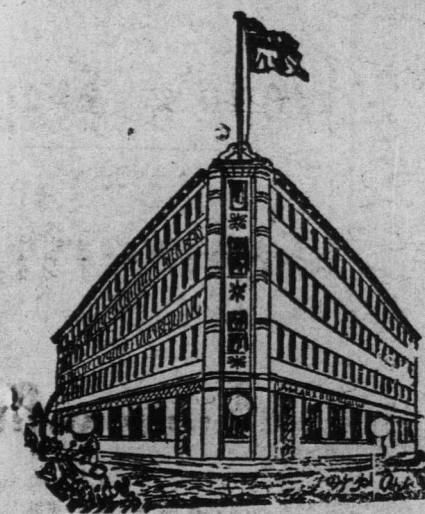

MARTHA'S VINEYARD, Mass., March 23.
The British schooner, *Basilio*, of Yarmouth, which sailed from Gonaives, Hayti, on March 7th, in ballast for Turk's Island, was driven high on the beach, on the south side of Martha's Vineyard to-day. The crew jumped ashore dryshod, and the vessel will probably be floated off without damage. When four days out from Gonaives, Capt. Percy died suddenly, from heart failure, and was buried at sea. Mate Thibodeau decided not to proceed to Turk's Island and to take the vessel home, but lost his reckoning in a fog.

GRIMSBY, March 20.
The French barque *Marie*, from San Francisco, for Hull, at the end of a long voyage, on Saturday, met disaster and destruction, which gave occasion for the heroic rescue of her captain and crew of 24 by the trawler *America*. The *Marie* went ashore late at night on Halesborough sands in the North Sea, during a blizzard, being pounded to pieces by terrific seas. The crew was in a desperate plight, and had almost lost hope, when the *America* hove in sight, and launched her lifeboats to take them off. The captain and mate refused to leave the ship until every man of the crew was safely aboard the *America*, whose boats were too battered to return to the *Marie*. The steward of the *Marie*, who had been brought to the *America* with his comrades, dived into the sea, with a life line, and swam to the wreck, from which the captain and mate were dragged through the sea to the rescuing vessel.

Goes Again.

The S. S. Lloydson went in on the Dry Dock Saturday and will have temporary repairs effected to her damaged stern post, and the work will be rushed to get the ship off to sea as soon as possible. It was decided to send the ship to the Gulf and she will go to Conception Bay to get a new stern post. There are still 26 men of the original crew aboard, and the others have been secured, about 100 men will go in her. She should get away Thursday, and it is hoped she will secure a good trip.

Small Crew.

Since the innovation of the steam fleet, it is said that the S. S. Kite has the smallest crew on record. In addition to her navigating crew she has only eleven men or nineteen in crew all told. The captain expected to get a full complement of men at Conche, early in the season, but being prevented from getting there by the heavy ice-pack north, she had to go on without even half a crew. If the Kite strikes the fat with the rest of the ships, a few thousand seals would give handsome bills to the men.

Strange Story.

Saturday night, as a lady was in a store on Water Street East, making a purchase, she suddenly felt a hand in the pocket of her coat and found it to be that of a woman who stood over her. Cable News.

BREMEN, Germany, March 23.
A Greek warship seized the German steamer *Irmgard*, off the island of Lemnos in the Aegean Sea. No reason is given for the capture.

LONDON, March 23.
The new crisis in the Balkans has led to the instant recall from their Easter vacations of the Ambassadors of the European Powers in London. They met in conference to-day, to discuss the situation.

LONDON, March 23.
A despatch from Belgrad Ered fortress, Adrianople, received this morning, shows that the garrison under Sherif Pasha has no intention of capitulating.

ROME, March 23.
Cardinal Respighi, Vicar-General to His Holiness, is dead, in his 70th year. The Pope is seriously ill, and was unable to celebrate mass to-day. He has not been notified of Cardinal Respighi's death.

CETTINGE, March 23.
It is semi-officially announced that Austria has presented an ultimatum to Montenegro demanding the suspension of military operations around Scutari until the entire civil population has left the town. In event of refusal, Austria will resort to arms.

PARIS, March 23.
The European War phantom will not come down. The Lyons correspondent of the *Libre Parole* has telegraphed that he has learned on the best authority that all Germans in the foreign colony there, have been ordered to hold themselves in readiness for mobilization orders.

CONSTANTINOPLE, March 23.
Skirmishing and fighting on the outskirts is reported along Tchatalja lines. The engagements have been frequent and desperate, but of no magnitude. The general staff, for the present, have decided not to allow the troops beyond the Tchatalja lines.

TERRE HAUTE, Ind., March 23.
Fourteen men are reported dead as the result of an explosion in the Superior Mine, No. 10, at Daggar, Indiana, about 35 miles south of here. No details.

HALIFAX, March 23.
The Duke and Duchess of Connaught and Princess Patricia, have sailed for England on the S. S. Empress of Britain.

NEW YORK, March 23.
Dr. Friedman will sell for Berlin three weeks hence to complete laboratory tests left unfinished. He will, however, return here two weeks after arrival.

WASHINGTON, March 23.
The United States will probably not patrol the North Atlantic Steamship line for icebergs, in view of the action of the British Board of Trade, in sending the whaler *Scotia* for patrol purposes. Meanwhile the Treasury Department is being strongly urged to assign revenue cutters to do the work, but Secretary McAdoo thinks the British action sufficient.

MONSIGNOR ROCHE ILL.—We are sorry to learn of the illness of Rev. Monsignor Roche, of the Cathedral. The rev. gentleman has been confined to his room since Friday, is suffering from a severe cold and is being attended by Dr. Mitchell. His many friends will hope to see him soon restored to health.

A Reply to "Interested."

Dear Sir.—Kindly allow me space in your esteemed Journal to say a few words in reply to "Interested." Undoubtedly he will receive more answers than mine, some advocating the affirmative while others will contend the negative as final. However, both parties are not wholly right. If this question could be legally dealt with, it would afford a very interesting subject, especially since a precedent would have to be established and also would come under the "Gambling Act" (at least I strongly surmise both of these statements to be correct.)
