

Th Finance Minister stated on Friday lest that he would table the in'armation on Monday and now he says that Mr. LeMessurier, the Denuty Minis ter of Customs, told him that the question would take a week to answer. Mr. Kent pointed out that the matter was most important for discussion, and the information should be supplied before going into Committee on Ways and Means.

The sceond reading of Council's amendment to Protection of Partridge Berries Bill, elicited some ad-Mr. Coaker objected to the Board

of Trade appointing an Inspector, and asked that the amendment be not considered. Provision should be made to protect the man who sells the berries as well as the man who buys

Mr. Kent said the amendment, as it stands at the present time, did not contain the object in view, and there was nothing to prevent the Board of Trade from making rules and regulations for inspection as long as such were approved of by the Governorin-Council.

Mr. Hickman believed the object of the amendment was to have the berries inspected when they arrived in St John's from the outports, and again inspected before exportation. He pointed out where one inspector, who was previously engaged by the Berries Co., made himself obnoxious to everyone, and said that is what would happen now unless a second inspector was employed and both appointed by the Governor-in-Council.
