Obituary.

JOHN KIELLY.

There died at Holyrood on Thursday, John Kielly, an old and respected resident of the South Side. He had been ailing for the past winter and death was not unexpected. The deceased was born at Holyrood sixty-eight years ago and was possessed of very charitable and pious characteristics. From early boyhood days he prosecuted the Labrador fishery until within a few years ago he

abandoned it and went into farming. He was a member of the Star of the Sea Association since its inception, and attended all its meetings and took a lively interest in its doings. He was for several years chairman of the South Side Cemetery Committee, and performed the duties of his office diligently and faithfully. His funeral took place on Saturday morning, the members of the Star of the Sea Association taking part as a body. After Requiem Mass at the Church of the Holy Cross, the Rev.

W. P. Finn, P.P., officiating, the funeral procession proceeded to the South Side Cemetery where the remains of a good citizen, pious Catholic and an honored member of Society were interred. The deceased has three sons, James, John, and Phillip, who fill positions of trust and responsibility in the United States. To them and to his sorrowing wife and daughter the Telegram extends its sympathy.

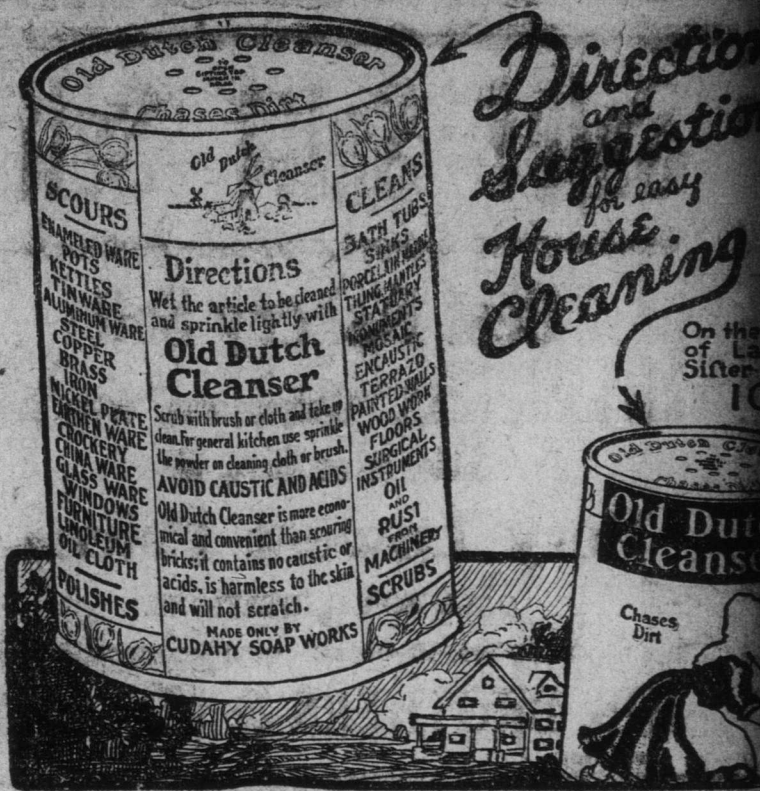
