By His Excellency SIR WALTER EDWARD DAVIDSON, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies.

Whereas on the Fifth day of August last I did issue my Proclamation specifying the Articles which it was my intention to treat as Contraband of War;

And whereas by an Order of His Majesty the King in Council of the Twentieth day of August, 1914, it was ordered that during the present hostilities the Convention known as the Declaration of London, should, subject to certain additions, and modifications therein specified, be adopted and put in force as if the same had been ratified by His Majesty;

And whereas it is desirable to add to the list of articles to be treated as Contraband of War during the present War;

And whereas it is expedient to introduce certain further modifications in the Declaration of London as adopted and put in force;

Now, therefore, I do hereby declare, by and with the advice of my Council, that during the continuance of the War, or until I do give further public notice, the articles enumerated in the Schedule hereto will, notwithstanding anything contained in Article 28 of the Declaration of London, be treated conditionally as Contraband.

Given under my Hand and Seal, at the Government House, St. John's, this 25th day of September, A.D. 1914.

LATEST LATEST**2.30 P.M.****GERMANS CLAIM THEIR FINANCES ARE GOOD.**

Special to Evening Telegram:—

LONDON, To-day.
An official statement recently received from Berlin by Marconi telegraph says the Board of Trustees of the Imperial Bank of Germany draw attention to the fact that the bank proved itself quite equal to the exceptional demands made upon it by the war, and that Germany is armed both economically and financially to fight the war on all sides until results have been obtained which will secure the political and economic future of Germany.

An inquiry has been held at Calman, Prussia, into the charges of high treason against Abbe Wetterlo, member of the Reichstag from Alsace Lorraine, who has been condemned to death and whose property has been ordered to be seized. The Germans in South Morocco have been made prisoners by the French and interned in Soudy, Province of Oran. The Germans are being treated well, it is said.

NOON.**THE SINKING OF THE CRUISERS.**

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, To-day.
The facts concerning the sinking of the British cruisers Aboukir, Hogue and Cressy by a German submarine or submarines are contained in an Admiralty statement issued last night. The reports of Commanders Nicholson of the Cressy and Norton of the Hogue, state that the Aboukir was hit by one torpedo and sunk in thirty-five minutes. Three torpedoes were fired at the Cressy, one of the explosive missing narrowly. The Hogue was struck twice, ten to twenty seconds elapsing between the torpedoes, and went under in the minutes. The Cressy fired on the submarine and some of her officers were confident that her shots sank her. Commander Nicholson says that the three torpedoes directed against his ship might have been fired by the same submarine, and that there is no real proof that more than one was engaged. Reports show that the greatest discipline was maintained, and that acts of heroism were performed, but the Admiralty has established a rule that such affairs must be governed by the same laws as prevail in naval and other actions, and that disabled ships must be left to their own resources rather than that other ships would be jeopardized by rescue work.

CRACOW OCCUPIED BY GERMANS.

LONDON, To-day.
That Cracow has been occupied by German troops, that the town was put under a German military command, that the Austrian Civil Administration has been displaced is the gist of the latest advices received here of the Petrograd correspondent of the Morning Post. All the original administration of the Austrian Government have left and the residents are fleeing in panic.

ROTTEN WITH SPIES.
LONDON, To-day.
Edgar Wallace, military expert of the Birmingham Post, writes on the extraordinary good information of the Germans and that they are constantly informed of the movements and even contemplated movements of English troops. News of every shipment of troops from England is telegraphed to Berlin by way of Holland, says Mr. Wallace. England and Scotland are rotten with spies. Under existing laws they may act with impunity, knowing that at the worst they may be only sentenced to penal servitude. He cautions us to be on our guard against the fasten of a few elderly Bayonet Drovers, we must not spill the blood of the brutes who are endangering the precious lives of our men and the safety of these realms.

ASQUITH'S WELCOME IN DUBLIN.
Special to Evening Telegram.

DUBLIN, To-day.
Asquith appeared at the Mansion House here to-night for the purpose as he expressed it in opening his speech, as head of the King's Government to summon loyal and patriotic Ireland to take her place in defence of our common cause. The Prime Minister received a tremendous welcome, and his opening speech was greeted with the greatest enthusiasm. He went on to say that there had been wars with regard to which there was diversity of opinion, but that that was not the case to-day. To-day he declared throughout the Empire without distinction of

creed, party or race, climate or class or sect, people were united in defending the principle of maintaining the interests which were vital not only to the British Empire but to all that was worth having in our common civilization and the future progress of mankind, whether Great Britain succeeded or failed. But, exclaimed the Premier, we are not going to fail. There could not be any higher cause, said the Premier, than the vindication of international good faith and the protection of the weak against violence of the strong and those who preached a practical religion of force. Germany was the real responsible factor in this war. Great crowds gathered in the streets of Dublin and cheered. Nationalist Volunteers who were armed with rifle and bayonet acted as Guards of Honor.

SAGONA BACK.—The s.s. Sagona, Capt. Kennedy, arrived in port from the Labrador service at 12.30 p.m. to-day. Capt. Kennedy reports a vast improvement in the fishery and weather conditions, and says that several of the vessels from Bonavista and Trinity Bays are now on their way home with good fares. The Sagona brought four cars of freight and 61 passengers, including about 50 fishermen returning from the Labrador, who were landed at their homes on the way along.

RAIN FORCES MEN OUT OF TRENCHES.
LONDON, To-day.
A correspondent to the Daily Mail in France says in France rain has affected a change in German operations on the Aisne. The chalky soil, he says, holds water in trenches like a cup and the autumn downpours therefore have driven the Germans out of their trenches and forced them to fight in the open, where the French got at them with their bayonets.

NO DECISIVE RESULTS.
PARIS, To-day.
For eleven days and ten nights the battle of the Aisne has continued practically without cessation, and still Paris waits for news of some decisive result. Here and there, according to official communication, the line has given way to one side or the other, but the importance of the incidents, if any, on way to one side or the other, but is apparent.

LATEST.—On the French left wing to the Northwest of Noyon where the French apparently have been trying to outflank the German right, where the French advanced troops, it is announced were compelled to give up the ground having come in contact with superior forces. New French troops were brought up however and French offensive was vigorously resumed. The communication says the struggle in this region has become extremely violent, similarly on heights of the Meuse, the Germans have had successes but they have not succeeded in the French communication says, in crossing the river. The French report, however, that on their right wing the Germans have begun to give way to attacks coming from Nancy while in southern region of Woerthe the enemy also retreated but the action continues.
