Baseball Third Annual Meeting.

SPLENDID SUCCESS. The third annual re-union of the St. John's Amateur Baseball League was held in Wood's West End Restaurant last night, Mr. J. O. Harvey, President of the League, in a manner most fitting performed the duties of Toastmaster. In his opening remarks he reviewed the history of baseball in this country and in doing so paid a high compliment to the members of the League who have for a time quit the game in order to participate in that greater game now being fought on the battle-fields of Europe. Over 60 per cent of the local baseball men have enlisted, the majority of whom left here with the first 500; fully 15 per cent more have been rejected owing to physical defects and the remainder, 25 per cent, are mostly married men whose services are required at home, but nevertheless are doing their bit in a quiet and humble manner. We take this opportunity of reminding the fans as well as the general public that the gate receipts for this season will be donated to the Ladies' Patriotic Committee. The speeches, though brief were of a high order. Songs and recitations were given by Messrs. Riggs, Crotty, Slattery, Hanlon, Hocken, DeGroot and Dr. Pritchard who came in on the shore train last night from Bay Roberts to be present on the occasion. 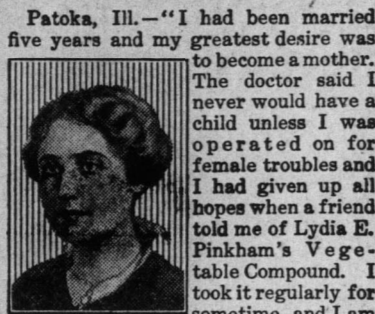

Stock Show on Empire Day.

While on a visit to the Old Country in 1912, Mr. H. Macpherson visited a number of stock farms for which the homeland is noted, and secured a number of pedigrees Arshire cows, a bull, the Cleveland Bay coach horse, "Statesman" breeds which he considered most adaptable for the requirements of Newfoundland. Mr. Macpherson has sent round a circular to induce farmers and stock raisers to bring their animals together for the purpose of showing what is being done. The show will be held on the Parade Ground in the forenoon of Empire Day, next Wednesday, the 24th inst., and Mr. Macpherson is offering a number of prizes. He has also invited a competent veterinary not acquainted with the city, to come here for the purpose of judging. This invitation has been accepted, and it is expected that the judging will be impartial and satisfactory. Mr. Macpherson is to be commended for his public spirit and his enterprise in this direction.

Electric Smelter for Little Fay.

We are informed that work in connection with electric copper smelting is about to commence at Little Bay. A dam about 45 feet wide and twenty feet deep is under construction on a small stream known as Burke's River. The dam is so situated that the cliffs, through which the stream flows, form its sides, thereby making the construction work easy. A number of men are employed working in the old dumps at the mines, and a considerable amount of copper ore is being extracted, and it looks as if small fortunes will be made from what in by-gone days was considered dirt.
