Cockle-Shell Ship and Incompetent Crew.

For some time past I have been perusing the laudatory remarks of the Opposition Press with regard to the self-constituted leader, Mr. Squires, and I fall to see where this ambitious and precocious young man has attained that experience or ability that would qualify him as one to whom we should trust to guide the destiny of our country. It is true he is possessed of a certain amount of verbosity, and would shine forth in a masterly manner during a tea-party or some other social gathering, where the viands could be praised, and the efforts of the promoters receive due honors. But when it comes to managing the public affairs of our country I am sure this brilliant young man is entirely out of place. Mr. Squires and his press would have us believe that he was actuated by purely patriotic and philanthropic motives when he rushed to the rescue of our country, which he asserts is in a terrible state of financial disorder and chaos through the incompetency and pilfering propensities of the members of the present Government. And yet never before in the history of Newfoundland have our people been in such a state of prosperity, as is clearly proven from the results of the many calls that have been made upon them both by Church and State. When our churches require loans to build or repair, the clergy have only to ask and they receive, and when the State required loans our people responded quickly and they will do so again when the next loan is asked for. This goes to show conclusively that our people are in prosperous circumstances. Our surplus is increasing year after year, and in the name of humanity why should we give up a certainty for an uncertainty? I do not know of any act performed by Mr. Squires that would warrant the people in believing that his movements are actuated by pure and disinterested patriotism.

The Opposition started out on their political voyage in the little cockle-shell ship which was planned, built and launched by Mr. Squires himself, assisted by a few hatched-and-saw politicians, who had been discarded by all parties for the past quarter of a century. They proved Jonahs in every political ship on which they formed part of the crew. Their movements at the present moment are actuated by jealousy, avarice, and I almost think, revenge. Is it in the nature of Mr. Squires and those associated with him to serve their country, or adopted country, without pay or position? Will Dr. Campbell do so, or will the few who surround him? Are they not at the present moment itching to have not alone their hand in the chest, but their arm, both arms; in fact, body and all. Here they are launching their cockle-shell craft, without compass or a course to steer by, with an incompetent crew and badly found in spars, sails, running gear, anchors and chains and all the other necessaries to prosecute the voyage upon the stormy sea of politics. Already the rats have deserted the frail little craft, and the crew will soon scuttle before she reaches the three mile limit. They are not going to trust their political lives and fortunes in such a floating coffin and under such inexperienced officers as Mr. Squires, Dr. Campbell and a few more land-lubbers.

The Opposition Press are guilty of a great wrong and have much to answer for in inducing Mr. Squires to believe that he is qualified to lead a party, and stifling the young man with the fulsome laudation which emanates from their columns from day to day. Some one has said that when we are praised with skill and decency it is the most agreeable perfume; but if too strongly imparted and admitted into a brain of less vigorous and happy texture, it will, like too strong an odor, overcome the senses and prove pernicious to those nerves it was intended to refresh. Mr. Squires was never cut out for a leader of men, physically, intellectually or any other way. He is ambitious, it is true, without the ability to carry out his ambition successfully, and like Cassius, he has a lean and hungry look and can't be trusted.

Temple INTEREST

The late Bishop Binney, of Scotland, told me at one time, when he went to a parish for the first time he based his first opinion of the parishioners upon the condition of the church fence and the yard. If he found them neglected, he was quite prepared to find many other things, temporal and spiritual, in an unsatisfactory condition, and vice versa.

Well, the old church-yard in St. John's is decently fenced and in condition, and if the stones were put upright, it would all measure up to the good Bishop's standard, not only give him a good opinion of the St. Paul's congregation, but it would also influence other strangers who think well of them too, for we are largely governed by appearance.

There are over 200 stones in this church-yard, and so others—probably the oldest, fallen down years ago—are covered with earth. The oldest on these stones above ground is Placentia, Harbour Grace, Bon and probably other places can older stones, with, no doubt, interesting epitaphs.

One reason for so many epitaphs is—in many instances order for a stone would be sent to Pool, England, by a captain of the vessels going there to fall. The order would be something like this—"Captain, please get a headstone and bring it out on 'spring. It is for my wife: she was born on August 1st: her name was 'and she was 50 years old. The 'verse of some kind put on it."

"This 'verse" so called was supplied by the stone cutter, times from his stock in trade, sometimes by a poet (?) for a man who did the cutting, and was given a free hand at epitaphs.

The words "Sacred to the memory" are found on nearly all the stones, and they are surrounded by various emblems of mortality, a skull and cross bones, a cornucopia, etc.

The serious sentiments embodied in some of the epitaphs are contrary to a belief in the resurrection, simple faith in the doctrine of stonement.
