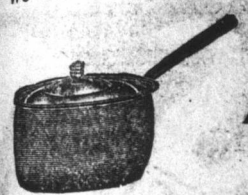

### Imposed on Turbulent Villages.

**PALESTINE.**—(Associated Press.)—The government forces in the district are attempting to stop here by imposing fines on the inhabitants of the communities which refuse to pay them, and following this with raids upon the town and villages in the district to collect the same. The experiment is an unusual one and its success up to the present is not evident. The Zionist movement and see in this action a deliberate alignment of the government against the Jews who were victims of the raids. It remains yet to be determined whether the fines will be paid. The seizure of the cattle deprived the farmers of means of plowing their fields and it is feared that this may lead to more unrest.

### The Royal Wedding.

TWO THOUSAND GUESTS AT THE ABBEY.

Although the date of the Royal wedding has not been definitely fixed, it will take place between February 20 and March 1. Nearly 2,000 guests will be invited to Westminster Abbey, but only those who have seats in the choir, and the first ten rows in the transepts, will actually witness the wedding. The others will have to be content with a view of the procession. No invitations have yet been issued, a fortnight's notice being usually considered sufficient for such occasions. The King and Queen, as a rule, invite personally their own relatives from abroad. It is expected that the Archbishop of Canterbury will have recovered his health in time to marry the Princess. The Bishop of London, it is hoped, will also be well enough to attend. If, unhappily, the Archbishop has not recovered, the Archbishop of York will probably be his deputy. The wedding reception will, it is expected, be held in the ballroom at Buckingham Palace. On such occasions it is usual to bring

from Windsor, where it is kept. It was last brought to the Palace for the banquet in honour of the Crown Prince of Japan. When Princess Patricia was married a luncheon was given at St. James's Palace, at which the King and Queen were present, and some 50 or 60 guests. St. James's Palace may be used to receive deputations and addresses of congratulation on a day to be fixed before the wedding. Presentations would be made at the same time. The Royal Household gift is always presented by the House Steward and several members of the various departments. The confectionery for all the State functions is made by the confectioners at Buckingham Palace, and it is presumed that they will make the wedding cake. The announcement that Princess Marie, the Roumanian Princess who finished her education in England, has been chosen as one of Princess Mary's bridesmaids, has aroused considerable interest. Princess Marie, like her brother and sisters, is a member of the Greek Orthodox Church. — News of the World.

### Miss Gertie Ryan

Winsome and clever as Miss Ryan undoubtedly is, still her chief charm on the stage is her poised and naturalness—qualities indeed very rare among amateurs. ### Princess Penniless Orphan.

The tragedy of one of the oldest royal dynasties is concealed in an ordinary advertisement published recently in newspapers in Saigon, French Cochinchina. In it Princess Renee, Jeanne, Suzanne, Valentine, Helen and Marcelle Mygdon, the six daughters of the heir to the throne of Burma, who was exiled by the British and died in Saigon a few weeks ago, advertised their gratitude to friends who had written to them sympathizing with them in the loss of their father. The Prince left no male heir. His daughters are entirely without means. The dynasty, which is thus extinct, reigned for more than 2,000 years. In the East it was regarded as even more glorious and of more divine origin than that represented by the Japanese Emperor.

### Furs for Princess.

Thirty-five thousand Daughters of the Empire in Canada are uniting to present Princess Mary with a magnificent gift of the finest Canadian fur on the occasion of her marriage to Viscount Lascelles. The kind of fur that will be chosen, and the form it will take, has not yet been decided, but it is certain that the present will be the most regal example of the Canadian furrier's art.

Canada has now nearly 70 ships operating on various trade routes, ranging from about 3,750 to 10,500 d.w. These services are assisting in the development of the Dominion's trade with Imperial and foreign markets to an important extent, regular routes having been established to Australia, New Zealand, the Far East, India, the West Indies, and South America. It is, indeed, stated with a good deal of justification that Canada very largely owes her successful Commercial Treaty with the West Indies to the fact that Dominion steamships were available for putting the Treaty upon a practical footing. At any rate, it is extremely unlikely that Jamaica would have signed the Treaty otherwise. Yet Great Britain still hesitates to establish a direct service with the West Indies. If it pays Canada, why should it not pay England?

### TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE.

NEW YORK, Jan. 26. The great plant of the Morse Dry Dock and Repair Company occupying 6 blocks along Brooklyn waterfront between Erie Basin and Fort Hamilton, was threatened with destruction to-day, when a fire wiped out five shop buildings, extending a loss estimated at more than two hundred thousand dollars. The floating Dry Dock, said to be the largest in the world caught fire, but the flames were soon extinguished. The tanker S.M. Spaulding in dock was slightly damaged.

### OPPOSITION GROWING.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27. Growing opposition to the Four Power Pact in United States Senate is giving Administration leaders in that body much concern. Failure to reach solution of the Siberian and Far Eastern questions is tending to strengthen opposition. A prominent Administration leader in the Senate, said yesterday the situation was such that while the naval agreement would be ratified, he doubted whether it would be possible to force the Four Power Treaty through.

### TRACTORS FOR ARTILLERY.

TORONTO, Jan. 27. A special cable to the Mail and Empire, from London, says the London Daily News understands that the War Office is substituting motor tractors for horses in every branch of the Royal Artillery. The change will enable the government to make a ten per cent reduction in the personnel.

### WORLD CONGRESS OF IRISH.

PARIS, Jan. 27. The World Congress of the Irish race began the last day of its meeting here this morning, with the discussion of a resolution putting delegates on record as desiring that the result of the London Conference negotiation of the Anglo-Irish Treaty was a denial of Self-Determination for Ireland. The resolution further pledges the delegates to use every means in their power to obtain complete independence for Ireland.

### PAPAL ELECTION.

ROME, Jan. 27. With the body of the late Pope Benedict laid away beneath the flagstones of St. Peter's interest of the sacred college and vatican household turned to-day to the election of his successor. Conclave has been called for February 2 to choose a new Pontiff. The question of rapprochement between the Church and the Italian Government has been the subject of a thorough canvass as of opinion in the vatican shows that the Peace Party, or those advocating closer relations with the Government, are virtually deadlocked with irreconcilables in the number of votes which each faction can muster. Two thirds majority is necessary for election. Twenty nine Cardinals, headed by Cardinal Gasparri, are known to favor a continuance of Benedict's policy, which was understood to have been directed towards resumption of relations with the quinquennial. Twenty are thought to be just as strongly opposed, while nine are classified as neutral. The attitude of United States Cardinals, O'Connell of Boston, and Dougherty of Philadelphia, is unknown at the vatican, but the opinion is expressed that unless a compromise is reached, never has there been such an opportunity for a foreign Cardinal to be elected Pope. The majority, enjoyed by Italian members of Sacred College, is so evenly divided, that vatican officials admit that all depends upon the attitude of the foreign Cardinals. The boom for Cardinal Maffi, Archbishop of Pisa, who was mentioned as favored by Government, appears to be on the decline, while Cardinals Gasparri and Cardinal Merry Del Val, respective leaders of Peace Party and Irreconcilables, are acknowledged by their supporters to have little chance of being elected themselves. The Candidate of Gasparri is Cardinal Ratti, of Milan, while Del Val's faction after the first vote for their leader, will switch, it is understood, to Cardinal Laurenti. Cardinal Van Rossum, of Holland, is the most prominently mentioned as a neutral candidate.

### JUDGEMENT RESERVED.

Judgement in the case of the Cape Broyle shopkeeper charged with manufacturing cigarettes without a license has been reserved. The case was concluded this morning before Judge Morris.

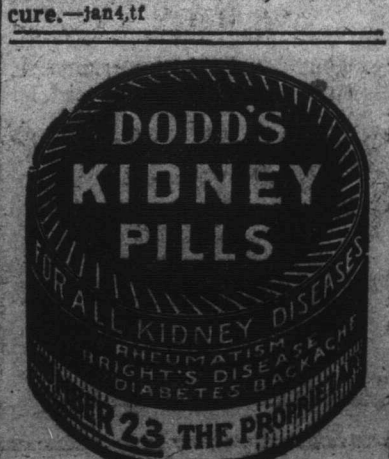
