bers of missionary enthusiasm?

TO BE EMPHASIZED. Six years ago when I had for the first time the opportunity and privilege of delivering the opening address to the Synod, I spoke as one whose knowledge and experience of the Diocese had been gained solely as a missionary or parish priest. My viewpoint was that of a man who for 30 years had to meet as best he could the difficulties and trials incident to a clergyman's lot in Newoundland.

During the past six years, as Bishop many and great opportunities have been afforded me of adding to the experience of earlier days, and of acquiring a more intimate acquaintance with the needs of the Church and of the people committed to her charge.
