Our Dumb Animals.

Report Of The Chief Agent For Week
Ending Oct. 17th, 1924.

Attended to the landing of 81 head of cattle from the Sackem. The cattle were carefully landed. Some had suffered a lot at sea, the steamer having taken water over the decks for hours, owing to the big storm. Also saw to the landing of 151 head of cattle from the Sapper. 2 calves, 1 horse, 2 cranes fowl, 2 crates pigs, 38 sheep. Landed them alright. They had to remain in the yard owing to some trouble about the Customs permit. Very thankful to the Furness Withy Company for having two watchmen to look after them through the night. They fed and watered them well. Also saw to the landing of two cargoes of choice cattle from the Railway Station for the Abattoir Co. Attended two sales of cattle. The cattle were all removed as soon as sold. Asked to humanely put to death a dog on Barnes Road. Received a report from a man of a dog on Howley Avenue who had bitten his horse. Found the owner who consented to have the dog shot; he told me to have a Veterinary Surgeon attend the horse if necessary. Received a report from Mr. John Brambrick of his horse slipping on the tar on Hamilton Street and breaking the two shafts of his wagon and cutting the horse's knees severely. Another fell on Waterford Bridge Road. One on LeMarchant Road being injured from the slippery tarvia pavement. Had to send in 3 horses for lameness for a rest. Received several complaints about horses being out all night in the cold, on rainy nights. I do hope that all horse owners will do their best to get in their cattle on cold and wet nights at this season of the year. Humanely put to death a dog on 16 Field Street, who was reported for biting a child on Merrymeeting Road. There has been several complaints about children being bitten by dogs recently. I wish the school teachers would impress on the school children the necessity of picking up the nails and glass that lie about the streets. Also wire hoops. These are dangerous to both pedestrians and horses. I am doing my best to attend all calls, Sundays and any hour of the night, to relieve the suffering of these dumb friends who cannot speak for themselves.

Home Hints

CORNMEAL GEMS.

Mix well together 1½ cups of cornmeal, 1½ cups of flour, 2 tablespoons of sugar, 2 teaspoons of baking powder and 1 teaspoon of salt. Beat the yolks of 2 eggs, add 1¼ cups of cream and ½ cup of milk and stir into the dry mixture. Beat well, stir in the stiffly whipped whites of the eggs and bake in well greased gem pans in a hot oven.

To keep butter cool, dissolve a little salt-peter in cold water and stand the butter (placed in a pudding-basin) in the water so that it may reach well up the sides. Dip a piece of muslin in water and place it over the bowl containing the butter, allowing the ends to rest in the salt-peter water so that it will keep constantly moist. This will keep the butter as firm as if placed on ice.

Fine black lace is used for the yoke and skirt flounce of an evening gown of black crepe.

Things Good to Eat

Rhubarb Marmalade.
Four pounds rhubarb, one cup cold water, six pounds sugar (granulated), four lemons, juice and rind, one pound walnuts, broken in small pieces. Wash, peel and cut the rhubarb in inch lengths, add water, and cook till tender. Take the rind of the lemons, put through chopper, and cook them separately until soft. Then cook them in the rhubarb, add sugar, lemon juice and walnuts, and cook all together for ten minutes, then bottle and seal.

Apricot Custard.
Half pound flour, half teaspoonful salt, one-quarter pound of lard or margarine, or half of each; cold water, apricot jam, one cup of milk (large), two eggs. Place flour, salt, and fat in a bowl; cut, flake and crumble in the fat; make into a stiff paste; roll out and line a shallow dish. Lightly decorate the edges; put a layer of jam on the bottom of the pastry; beat the egg up well, add the milk sugar and flavouring, giving a final mix. Pour into the dish. Bake in a fairly hot oven. Before serving, place a paper collar round the dish.

Cheese Fondue.
One cup of scalded milk, one cup bread crumbs, quarter of a pound of grated cheese, one tablespoon of butter, half a teaspoon of milk, yolks of three eggs, beaten. Mix crumbs, cheese, butter and salt together and add egg yolks. Beat the whites and fold into the mixture. Bake in a moderate oven twenty minutes. Dish may be put into pan of water, but a longer time will be required for baking.
