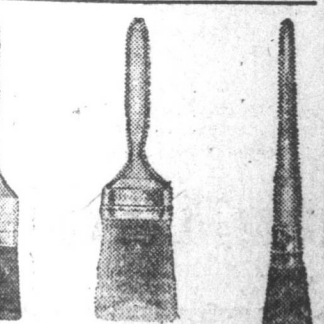

## House of Assembly

TUESDAY, April 14.

The House opened at 3 p.m. MR. WARREN presented a petition from the people of Hermitage, asking that that place be made the Capital of the new district created under the Redistribution Bill.

MR. DUFF presented a petition from the people of Victoria on the subject of unemployment relief.

MR. HALFYARD presented a number of petitions from the electors of Trinity District, on various matters.

MR. RANDALL presented a petition from the residents of New Harbor, on the subject of a road.

## QUESTIONS.

Replying to a question from Mr. Warren, the MINISTER OF FINANCE AND CUSTOMS said permission for export of wood to St. Pierre had only been granted in the case of birch wood in junk.

In reply to Mr. Scammell, THE MINISTER OF FINANCE AND CUSTOMS said "I have no knowledge of any intention of the government to restore Mr. E. J. L. Levesque. As to the suggestion of appointing Mr. F. C. Archibald I do not regard it as a compliment to that young and energetic gentleman to be asked to regard him as seeking a government job."

The Committee stage of Ways and Means, Supply, and the Textile Resolutions, was deferred.

The Amendments to the Judicature Act was taken up in Committee and explained by the Minister of Justice. Under the Bill Supreme Court may be held by one Judge, the standard of qualification for Grand Jurors is raised and the age limit for serving on juries is raised from sixty to sixty-five. The Measure is the result of the deliberations of the Court.

It passed Committee with some Amendment. The Report was adopted and the Bill goes to third reading tomorrow.

The House went into Committee of the Whole on the Bill to Amend Chapter 74 of the Consolidated Statutes, entitled "Of Old Age Pensions."

THE PRIME MINISTER pointed out that the Bill provided that the old lady's age should be 70 years, but he had an open mind on the matter and would agree to having it set at a younger age.

MR. HICKMAN agreed with the Prime Minister as to age and suggested that it should be put at 65 years or even 60. He thought that provision should be made so that the pension would not continue if she remarried.

THE MINISTER OF JUSTICE said he thought the age could be set at 60 years and the pension to cease in case of remarriage.

MR. BROWN agreed with the previous speakers and urged that the pension should be made available to men of 70 years of age.

MR. P. MOORE said that no Bill that ever came to his notice, during the past 16 years, appealed so much to him as the present one, and the Prime Minister should be complimented on the Bill. It was to him a wonder that all the politicians of former years, none had the foresight or wisdom of introducing a measure that would provide for the widows of aged fishermen.

MAJOR CASHIN gave his support to the Bill, which he termed was the most human that has been introduced for years. He complimented the Prime Minister and added that all over Newfoundland people would appreciate his action on behalf of the old fishermen and his wife.

The Bill was amended by putting the age of eligibility at 65 and providing that the pension continue until remarriage or death.

The Bill respecting the Records of Pure Bred Animals passed Committee stage without amendment.

Section 3 which reads that the Minister may appoint such officers as he may deem necessary for carrying out the provisions of the Act, evoked some humorous debate, in which the Leader of the Opposition, the Minister of Justice, Mr. Warren and Hon. W. Woodford took part.

THE MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE pointed out that it was not the intention to make any new appointments as he felt that the work of registration could be done with the present staff.

MR. HICKMAN thought that a registration fee should be charged.

MR. WARREN agreed with the suggestion, but the Minister did not concur.

The Bill "An Act to Amend Chapter 4 of the Consolidated Statutes, entitled 'Of Legislative Disabilities and the Vacation of Seats in the House of Assembly,'" was given second reading.

MR. HALFYARD again voiced his protest against the Bill, and Mr. Godden claimed that it did not redound to the credit of the Government as it was to give a soft job to some member of the Government.

The Bill "An Act Respecting a Tax on certain Incomes," was deferred from second reading, and the House adjourned.
