CATTLE DYING IN LARGE NUMBERS

The Long Cold Spell and Chilling Wind has its Effect

Messrs. Munns and Beveridge, of Brooks, who are prominent ranchers at Springbank, near Brooks, report that in their district and indeed all along the line cattle are dying in immense numbers from cold and starvation. The causes which led to this deplorable state of things are the intense cold which has prevailed during the last few days and the fact that the ranchers of the district have run short of hay and also of grain. According to these gentlemen this is no question of one isolated instance of want of care on the part of any single rancher, but that throughout the entire district the ranchers have wantedly allowed their cattle to die from lack of care. True the cold snap was not expected, but at the same time the catastrophe could not have occurred if the ranchers had shown any forethought.

The number of the dead cattle is said to be so numerous that their carcasses can be seen frequently by travellers who pass in the trains on the main line.

In Favor of University

The following important resolution has been passed by the Calgary synod: Calgary, Dec. 19, 1906.

To the Hon. A. C. Rutherford, Premier of Alberta and Minister of Education:

Sir: At a meeting of the executive committee of the Synod of the Diocese of Calgary, held in Calgary on Tuesday, Dec. 13, the following resolution was unanimously passed: "Whereas the interests of higher education in the province of Alberta render necessary the establishment of a provincial university at an early date, therefore

"Resolved that his honor the lieutenant governor in council be most respectfully asked to take all necessary steps for the establishment of the university as soon as possible.

"And that a copy of this resolution be sent to the honorable the premier and minister of education for Alberta."

MINISTERS ARE CHEAP POLICE

Without Churches no Person Would Live in any City as all Says Mr. Hunter

THE CHURCHES SHOULD BE LEFT OPEN ALWAYS

Interesting Services Held at the Central Methodist Church Last Night

Owing to the continued absence of Mr. Crossley, who is suffering from a cold, the service which was held by the evangelists at the Central Methodist Church last night was short of its brightness. The platform was crowded with ministers and the church was filled with people.

The opening of the meeting was sudden and unprecipitated. Without preamble Mr. Hunter asked for the prayers for a young man who had lost his job through drink. "Poor fellow," said Mr. Hunter.

Turning to brighter themes, Adjt. Byers, S.A., referred in eulogistic terms to the editorial which appeared in the Albertan yesterday dealing with the evangelists. "Laborers were worthy of their hire," said the adjutant and sat down.

Mr. Hunter was snappy and brisk. He hoped within a few hours to shake the editor of the Albertan by the hand for his "fair and bright editorial."

Many revivals had been made and many souls had been saved by the newspapers reporting the meetings and so spreading the knowledge of the good work. People should be careful not to throw away these reports. They should cut them out and send them to their friends in the east. Who could tell where the seed would fall? Also the reporters should not be forgotten for it was to the reporters to whom the primary debt was owing.

"Revivals. Show me a church with no revivals and I will show you a church which is dead. A church with out power. What did the revival of which the prophet Ezra spoke which cost \$75,000 in sheep, cattle and other live stock, all of which the Lord was mightily pleased. God always paid rewards. The harpoon was the weapon for the preachers. Harpoon the people and then they feel it. Let preachers be strenuous, fearing neither rich nor poor. Trouble brought people to God and courage was the need of the pulpit. Calgary was a wilderness of idols. The idol of Calgary was the dollar. Passing to the question of family worship he said that the dust on the Bible in some houses was so thick that the word damnation was written in it.

"Ministers! Ministers! Well, what

about them? They were the cheapest policemen that the people ever paid for. Tear down the churches in Calgary and not a lot would be sold. Business would be at a standstill. And why? Because the people would have left the city and gone to another where there were some churches.

Coming back to business, said Mr. Hunter, "down east a widow placed \$100 on the plate and asked that the prayers of the congregation be offered up for her unconverted son. Within 24 hours her son, who was not within 100 miles of the town was converted.

The churches should follow the example of the Catholic churches and remain always open. If the theatres could keep open, so could the churches. What had the spirit of God done in the world? What wonderful men had it not raised up. Luther, Knox, Wesley, Whitfield, Spurgeon, Moody and Geo. Muller. These were all men who had been guided by the spirit.

After Mr. Kerby had sung a song a sermon followed by the Rev. J. A. Clark on the marvellous work of St. Paul.

Above all things St. Paul was the apostle of the Cross, of the scaffold as it was today, the most shameful thing that existed.

In his concluding address Mr. Hunter said that he had been stopped on the street by a woman who told him that her entire family, eight children in all, had been addicted to drink, or another one who was not mentioned came up again.

The other petitions were for fathers, brothers and so forth, with the exception of a petition by Rev. G. W. Kerby for a wife and children who had been ruined by a drunken husband.

Calgary May be Secure



James Short represented the plaintiff and urged that though the charter did not contain an express provision giving a right of action for damages for non-repair, a perusal of it showed an intention on the part of the legislators that the city should be liable for non-repair.

He cited the case of Cuzner v. Calgary in which the city was held liable under an ordinance not framed so favorable to the plaintiff as the charter.

It was also urged that the provision in the Municipal Ordinance giving the right of action for damages in such cases had not been repealed by the charter. If such a provision were not in force, Calgary was the only place in Alberta, or for that matter in Saskatchewan, Manitoba or Ontario in which no provision had been made in city charters or municipal acts for the right of action against a civic corporation for injury sustained by reason of its failure to repair its roads and streets.

At the conclusion of the argument the judge reserved his decision.
