He enlisetd in Guelph with the 43rd Howitzer Battery November 1915, went to England in February, 1916 and to France on July 1st of the same year, where he put in 22 strenuous months with his battery, being wounded on the 26th of September, 1918. With an officer Hugh had gone out to get a new position for their battery and were within 300 or 400 vards of the German trenches when the Germans started to shell them. They dropped into a shelter which the enemy discovered and shelled making a direct hit on Hugh was struck in the leg and the officer on the chin. His limb was badly shattered and after being carried back about three miles on a stretcher all the way under shell fire, to a hospital, the leg was amputated below the knee.
