The veteran municipal legislator on coming to the front was received with applause. He thanked the electors for the continued confidence they had placed in him in the past by electing him to the Council, and solicited a continuation of their support. "I was the first mayor of the city of London," he said, "and I think East London should have the honor of electing the next year's chief magistrate from among its residents." He referred briefly to the \$25,000 gcant to the C. P. R., which he did not favor. He expressed his belief that the Council would in some way or other be outwitted by the shrewd railway men. "I do not want to fight with a railway company," he said, "but an effort should be made to effect a just return for the city's money.

Ald. Bartlett was the next speaker. He referred to his work in the Council and as a member of No. 3 Committee, believing that he had done his duty. The chief matter the committee had disposed of was the electric light question, the contract being let for three years. The Council, he thought, should have purchased its own electric light plant, as it would be method by every elector for himself. He thought the idea of reducing the number of wards to three was ridiculous, and in view of the weighty matters to be handled by the Council in the near future he considered eighteen aldermen few enough. 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
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
