SONS OF ENGLAND.

The New Constitution—Sons of Englishwomen Eligible for Membership.

Woodstock, March 18.—The Sons of England Grand Lodge, which was in convention here during last week, decided by a straight vote that the order was not prepared to create a sovereign lodge with district grand lodges, but that the present Supreme Grand Lodge would answer all requirements for a time, if certain amendments were made to the constitution. The committee which had drafted the new constition, however, had incorporated

the machinery for creating district grand lodges; this was allowed to stand to a large extent, so that it will be on hand when needed, but certain clauses were cut out so as to make it impossible in the meantime to put the balance into operation or create the Provincial Grand Lodges. It is anticipated that in a year or two, when the subordinate lodges have familiarized themselves with the scheme, the present antagonism to the matter will die out, and the extended organization which the expansion of the order demands will be approved.

The most important modification made was in the qualification of membership. Hitherto a member must have been English born or the son of an English father, but this restriction has been now modified to allow the admission of the sons of English women as well, so that in future any candidate who has either parent English-born will be eligible. It is expected that this change will increase the membership of the
