Unprecedented Occurrence in the House.

Sir Charles Tupper Resigns, But Only for a Few Minutes.

Sequel to a Recent Scandal Exposure—\$15,000,000 Asked for a Canal—Alban's Great Triumph.

Ottawa, Feb. 18.—Sir Charles Tupper reappeared in the House this afternoon, the first time since his introduction. He only remained a very short time. Upon the orders of the day being called, several inquiries were made across the floor as to being returns, and the baronet, after being prompted by Mr. Foster, the deposed leader in the House, arose and replied to them as the Administration spokesman.

Mr. Davin resumed debate on the budget. He supported the high tax policy, and said that he could not understand the Liberal platform. He argued that a Liberal Government could not get reciprocity.

Mr. Bain (Wentworth), a level-headed farmer, asked, "What was the policy upon which the Government went to the country in the elections of 1891?" The answer was that it had been upon the promise that a reciprocity treaty could, and would be obtained. Mr. Davin accused the Liberal party of not having any clear and consistent policy. What had been the policy of the Government since 1891? Mr. Bain asked again. The country had seen the Cabinet Ministers on strike, and then return within the fold. And then there was that most pitiable exhibition when, after the Cabinet had called Parliament together and put into the mouth of the Governor-General the session's programme, seven members had gone on strike. Was this the kind of Government whose supporters could charge another party with inconsistencies? But the fact was that the Liberal platform could be charged with neither inconsistency nor indefiniteness.

Mr. Bain contended that the policy of high taxation had not benefited the dairy interest, and adduced evidence that the progress of the dairy interest was attributable to the enterprise of the farmers, aided by the financial and sympathetic co-operation of the Ontario Government. A veteran cheesemaker like Mr. McPherson, of Glenora, had said that the industry would have thriven in Canada if there had never been an import duty on cheese. On the contrary, the N. P. really imposed duties on the findings of cheesemaking equal to 1 cent a pound. The same was true of butter and of hogs. Speakers of the Government, he pointed out, had contradicted themselves. Mr. Davin had on the order paper notice of a resolution by which he asked the Government to give a bonus to butter exported to the London markets, and also to put on an import duty of six cents a pound "to enable Northwest farmers to compete with the Australian exporters in the British Columbia market." Here was the policy which Mr. Davin supported—bonusing steampans to bring Australian butter to British Columbia and then putting on export duties to keep the butter out.

Mr. Henderson (Halt) took up the defense of the high tax policy. He denied the statements made by Mr. Bain that the Conservative party had appealed to the country in 1891 on the question of reciprocity. It was the old policy of protection that they had submitted to the approval of the people. He declared, however, that the Conservative party favored reciprocity with the United States, provided it could be secured upon what it regarded as equitable terms.

At five minutes to 1 o'clock this morning Mr. Henderson was talking to twenty members, showing how unpopular late night sittings are. The Speaker's attention was called to the fact by Mr. Mulock. The Speaker ordered the division bell rung and members ran in from all directions. This is an utterly unprecedented procedure, contrary to the usage of Parliament and the wholesome ruling requiring the presence of twenty members in the House for the transaction of business. The House could never be counted out, no matter how prosy the orator of the moment or how insignificant the business, if the division bell is rung and time given for members to come in. The division bell can only be rung regularly for divisions or the opening of the House. It looks as if the Speaker "rose to the occasion" in order to force the continuance of the sitting at unearthly hours in the morning of a statutory holiday. The number in the House when the call was made was thirteen. The rule of the House is that when the Speaker's attention is called to the absence of a quorum he shall immediately count those present. If there are not twenty the House must rise.

Mr. Lewis moved the adjournment of the debate.

Representative Young Liberals met tonight to perfect arrangements in connection with the convention to be held here next month. There was a large attendance.

The Supreme Court has given judgment for Mr. St. Louis against the Dominion Government for over \$50,000, the balance of his claim on the Montreal bridge contract. The appeal of Neelon against Toronto, arising out of the court house contract, was decided in favor of the city.

The Government has obtained judgment against Mr. Andre Senecal for \$12,500 paid him by contractors as bribes while he was superintendent of the Printing Bureau. The appeal of the Liberals in recent sessions. As long as possible Senecal was screened.

When a delegation called upon them to day, to ask for \$15,000,000 for the Ottawa Valley Canal, the Government gave a sympathetic answer. This is the time when promises bring votes!

The Opera House was crowded last

night to its utmost capacity to hear Madame Albani. Lord and Lady Aberdeen and the Government House party occupied boxes, and not only was every seat occupied, but even standing room was unobtainable. The diva was in excellent voice and her singing was as perfect as ever.

Dr. Montague had a special train to Halifax, N. S. He sailed for England on the Vancouver.

At the railway committee meeting yesterday, the Nipissing and James Bay Railway came up for consideration. The bill provides for the road being built in sections, the whole to be built within seven years. Mayor Fleming and Ald. Davis and Scott, Toronto, opposed the bill. They asked that the company should be compelled to go on within one year on pain of forfeiting the charter, as their opinion was that the charter was being held for speculative purposes, as over ten years elapsed since it was first granted. It was in the interest of Toronto that the road should be built at once. Col. Tisdale objected to the limitation, and the bill was reported.

Premier Peters of Prince Edward Island, who is in the city on business, says of the outlook for the coming general elections: "We expect that the entire Ottawa delegation will be Liberal this time. The feeling is that way. We did pretty well last time, but we will be solid at the next general election." Mr. Peters is the youngest Premier in the Dominion. He is very popular.

The report comes from St. Johns, said to be based on semi-official information, that negotiations are progressing between England and France which will for all time settle the Newfoundland French shore fishery question. The basis of the settlement is said to be the ceding to France of England's interests in the State of Tunis, Africa, in exchange for the French claim in Newfoundland.

The bill to incorporate the Huron and Ontario Railway Company, a proposed electric road, tapping many towns in Western Ontario, was passed by the Railway Committee yesterday, with certain amendments. It was provided that the road should be built (a) Port Perry to Kincardine, touching at Mount Albert, Newmarket, Bradford, Beeton, Shelburne, Priceville, Durham, and Walkerton; (b) from Priceville, through Meaford, Owen Sound, Southampton, Port Elgin and Walkerton to Kincardine; (c) from Walkerton, through Midway, Teeswater and Lucknow to Goderich, with a connection between Lucknow and Kincross. The bill said "at or near the place" but this term was taken out. The bonding power was limited to \$10,000 a mile for single track and \$16,000 for double track. The proposed incorporators are: A. McKinnon Cameron, of Meaford; Josiah W. Curtis, of Port Perry; Albert E. Scanlon, of Bradford; Henry J. Robton, of Shelburne; Wm. Laidlaw, of Durham; Henry Horton Miller, of Hanover; McNamee, of Walkerton; John Green, of Lucknow; W. R. Thompson, of Teeswater; Joseph Carter Graham, of Walkerton; and Andrew Malcom, of Kincardine, most of whom were present.

AFTER THIRTY-FOUR YEARS.

A Husband and Wife Are Reunited.

The Former Went to the War in 1862—He Also Regains a Son, Aged 34, Whom He Had Never Seen.

Sandusky, Ohio, Feb. 19.—E. C. Bowne, of Carroll township, last Friday met his son, aged 34 years, whom he had never before seen and who was reunited to his wife, whom he saw married just before the war. Bowne was married just before the war and was one of the first to enlist to serve his country. At this time his wife and himself lived in Elmore, Ottawa county, Ohio, and the parting between the young husband and wife was an affecting and sad one. When Bowne went into the army his wife returned to her parents to live, and only a few months after her husband's departure she gave birth to a son, the man whom E. C. Bowne met on Friday.

While in the war Bowne became an habitual drunkard, and after being released from duty, though he had got nearly as low as it was possible for man to get, he took an oath that he would never return to his wife, nor let her hear from him, until he could "go back a man."

For 21 years he struggled to overcome his drink habit, and it was not until the end of that time that he was able to control himself, or his desire for liquor. As soon as he had sworn off and was able to live without resort to his bottle, he returned to his old home in Elmore to join his wife, but she was not there, neither did the residents of that town know anything about her. He made attempt after attempt to locate his wife, but was unsuccessful until a few weeks ago.

As above stated, Mrs. Bowne returned to the home of her parents after her husband had joined the army, and after letters from him ceased to arrive she came to the conclusion that he had been among the many "unknowns" who had lost their lives on the battlefields. During the '70s her parents moved to Hartford, Conn., and she went with them. However, she did not seek another husband, but continued to live always thinking of the one whom she supposed had lost his life during the great war.

What was her surprise, a few weeks ago, to see in a newspaper the statement that E. C. Bowne, of Ohio, had been granted an original pension. She wrote the pension officials, not daring to think E. C. Bowne was her husband, but merely "out of curiosity," as she expressed it.

These inquiries led to a correspondence between the one-time lovers, and then Mrs. Bowne started for this city to meet her husband.

For a number of years past Bowne has been living in Carroll township, leading the life of a recluse, but after receiving the letter from his wife he "spruced" up and impatiently awaited her arrival. The meeting was arranged to take place in a hotel, and when long-separated husband and wife did meet it was a most affecting scene. But there was another surprise for the old man—the introduction to his son. His wife introduced her boy as Mr. Burt Bowne, of Hartford, Conn., but the old man could not understand the situation, and it had to be explained over and over to him before he realized that he had regained a son as well as his wife. The people will remove to Hartford, Conn., where the young man is in business.

The Barrie Murder.

The Assassin, Brennan, Freely Confesses His Guilt.

A Conjectural Motive for the Crime Assigned.

Had Deceased Been Investing Brennan's Money?—Sketch of the Principals.

Barrie, Ont., Feb. 19.—The murder of John A. Strathy, late manager of the Bank of Toronto here, by Michael Brennan yesterday, continues to create great excitement and mystery.

Brennan called at Overden, Mr. Strathy's house at Lake and Duckworth streets, and asked the servant, who answered the door for Mr. Strathy. The girl asked who wished to see him, and Brennan replied, "A friend." Mr. Strathy came to the door and Brennan deliberately shot him in the breast, the bullet entering just above the heart. Mr. Strathy fell to the floor, and his wife, who had heard the shot, ran to him. He said to her: "Brennan has shot me," and then lost consciousness. Dr. W. A. Ross was summoned quickly and was soon joined by Drs. Smith and McCarthy, but Mr. Strathy expired three-quarters of an hour after being shot.

ADMITTS HIS GUILT. Brennan, who surrendered himself, freely admits his guilt, stating that Mr. Strathy had shoved him out of the house, and that he drew his revolver, and fired the shot at the moment and fired. He further said to Detective Beardsley that last summer he had another revolver that he intended to use for the same purpose, but he consulted the priest in Midland, who told him to at once destroy the revolver, and never take a priest's advice, and to use his words, buried his revolver in the waters of Georgian Bay.

A POSSIBLE MOTIVE. The motive that prompted Brennan is only conjectural. One motive advanced for the crime here is that which seems to gain ground among some people. Mr. Strathy, who for the past 27 years had been manager of the Bank of Toronto here, had gone heavily into the investment of his money with his brother. He resigned his position here owing to this difficulty. It is said that Brennan had quite a little money, which Mr. Strathy was investing for him, and it was to secure some explanation regarding this that Brennan went to the house and caused the trouble. The prisoner so far has not made any statement in this line.

THE MURDERED MAN. The murdered man had lived here for 27 years and was very popular throughout the surrounding country. Only yesterday Mr. Strathy was nominated for the office of first deputy reeve, which has recently become vacant. He was a prominent member of the Reformed Episcopal Church here. He had a wife and six children.

The murderer, Michael J. Brennan, has been known in and around Barrie for 25 years. For some years after locating here he was a carpenter. He married a girl named Hurley, who was a domestic in the household of Senator Gowan, an uncle of the murdered man, and was intensely jealous of his wife, and there is a story about the effect that Brennan labored under the idea that Mr. Strathy had been intimate with the girl before she married. This, however, is only rumor, and is not believed. Brennan gave up carpentering, and went into the hotel business, taking charge of the Victoria hotel, which he ran for a couple of years, until the Scott Act came into force.

ON HIS THOUGHT INSANE. Brennan left Barrie about six years ago for Midland, taking his wife and family with him. While there he became involved in trouble with a lawyer named Steers, whom he accused of undue intimacy with Mrs. Brennan. The lawyer had Brennan arrested on a charge of larceny, and he was committed to Barrie jail, where medical men examined him, and found that he was insane. Mrs. Brennan subsequently separated from her husband, and is said to be now living in Toronto, where she has a brother who is a bank employee. Brennan went to Toronto a few months ago and secured employment with the Massey-Harris Company. He did not turn up here again until yesterday, when he was arrested from Toronto on the afternoon train. When arrested he had \$35 in cash and a Massey-Harris check. Besides those in the revolver, he had three extra cartridges.

DECEASED WELL CONNECTED.

Toronto, Feb. 19.—The news of Mr. Strathy's death was received in Toronto with the greatest regret, as he was well known to the business section of the community, and frequently visited the city, where he had a large number of friends and acquaintances. The murderer, Michael J. Brennan, was born in Toronto about 50 years ago, and was the son of the late Mr. John Strathy. A large number of his relatives and connections reside in the city. He was married to a sister of Chief of Police Grasset, Dr. Grasset, and Mr. A. W. Grasset. Mr. Henry S. Strathy, manager of the Traders' Bank, and the late Dr. Strathy were his uncles. His father, Robert J. Strathy, and Mr. Arthur G. Strathy, are also residents of Toronto.

LOST TEN SONS IN A YEAR.

Death of Charles L. Spalding Follows Remarkable Afflictions.

Chicago, Feb. 19.—Chas. L. Spalding, the stationer, who died last night at his home, No. 9 St. James' Place, after many months of suffering, had an experience of bitterness and sorrow such as is seldom crowded into one human life. During the last year he had buried ten sons.

ALFRED PITT'S CONFESSION.

Was a Burglar—His Conscience Awakened by the Salvation Army—Buried Plunder in London.

Windsor, Feb. 19.—Alfred Pitt walked into the police station Monday night and said to the chief:

"I am a burglar."

Then he set about proving his assertion. He said that in November last he and a partner, whose name he had forgotten, broke into a jewelry store in Woodstock by smashing a \$70 window, and took about \$30 worth of goods. They carried their plunder to London, buried it in the bank of the River Thames and then sought shelter in the police station. On coming out the morning after, they separated to avert suspicion, and when Pitt reached the spot at which they had buried their booty, he found that his faithless partner had carried it off. Then he came to De-

troit, was converted by the Salvation Army, and learned that it was his duty to give himself up.

THE TRAMP WAS THERE.

Carnival at the Princess Rink—Geo. Crabbs Wins the Mile Race for Tramps—Those in Costume.

George Crabbs proved to be the swiftest tramp on skates at the Princess rink last night and he took first prize in the one mile race for tramps. Geo. P. McLaren was a close second.

A carnival, a tramp skating race and the popularity of the resort attracted a very large crowd to the Princess rink last night. The ice was in good condition, the music by the Musical Society Band was enlivening and in every way the evening proved one of pleasure. The tramp race was called at 8:30, and when a half dozen tough-looking characters lined up to the scratch, they were more anxious to start than the average tramp is to begin a job, and when once they got away they made a lively run. Crabbs and McLaren kept well together for first place. S. Cook was a good third, while F. Moore and W. Wilson only made two laps before they found that racing was too much like hard work and that they had got mixed up in too fast company.

ONE SUN HAS DISAPPEARED

It Probably Revolved Near This Earth and Scorched Vegetation.

The great density of several satellites which accompany planets in our solar system is also a very strong proof in favor of the truth of the theory that all the revolving spheres in the heavens are increasing in size rather than diminishing, writes W. That our own solar system has now but one central sun is no reason whatever that it did not at one time have two. The very fact of there being discovered what are known as double stars (suns), is a very good proof that every other solar system in the universe is not always like our own as regards the number of their suns—in an every respect. A Ghostly Record.

One Hundred and Thirty-Five Thousand and Victims of Turkish Outrages.

Constantinople, Feb. 19.—The following is a Turkish estimate of Turkish violence in the Province of Harpoot and some of the adjacent villages, being a translation of a list prepared in Turkey by a local Moslem occupying a high governmental position. The original is sealed with his seal. The total number killed is given at 39,234, and the number of destitute at 94,770. The following are among the atrocities:

Persons burned to death in the fires 1,383
Ministers, priests and school teachers killed 51
Deaths from hunger and cold 3,266
Deaths in mountains and snow 4,320

Monasteries, schools and churches demolished or burned 227
Number of women and girls forcibly taken in marriage by the Moslems 1,522
