LONDON LOSERS.

Hamilton, June 14.—Hamilton in a measure atoned for the fearful work of Monday by playing great ball yesterday, and administering a defeat to the Londoners. Hamilton's work on the field was wonderful, particularly that of Dean, who was knocking down hits all through the game. The only error was made by Conwell, who failed to pick up the ball thrown to the plate, letting in the first run that London got. Hamilton began by batting out runs, a single by Hagerty, error by Keeney, a double by Conwell, and a single by Phillips making three runs in the first. After the second inning no hits were made off Deal until the fifth, but in that and the three following innings eleven hits, including a two-bagger by Phillips and home runs by Elton and Baker, were made, and nine runs were added. London's hits off Baker were scattered, and in light places the boys pitched remarkably well. In the ninth, however, London made things lively for a while. Howells got first on balls, and Saunders batted out a home run. Then Ruening got a two-base hit on a fly to right, which Strouger misjudged. A hit by Meara scored Ruening, but the next two went down and left Hamilton victorious by 12 to 4. Saunders, Grimshaw and Ruening did good hitting for London, but the way old Marr Phillips and several of the other Hamiltons hammered the ball was a marvel. Buffalo, June 15.—A sensational move has been made in the crusade against public games of baseball in Buffalo on Sunday.
