## THE LAW CAN BE ENFORCED,

Says Rev. C. T. Scott, Speaking on Prohibition Question.

Various Phases of the Subject Discussed at Length at Meeting

The regular meeting of the W. C. T. U., over which Mrs. Thornley presided, was held yesterday afternoon in Somerset Hall. The day being Crusade Day a number of new, active and honorary members were added to the roll. The attendance was good. Mr. J. H. Bowman moved that a monster meeting be held in the interests of the prohibition cause to offset the efforts put forth by opponents of the mea-sure. The motion was unanimously

During the educational hour the subject of prohibition was taken up, when different phases of the movement were dwelt upon, and emphasized by the various speakers.

THE REV. J. G. BISHOP, of the First Methodist Church, was the first speaker. He began by reading a portion of the sixth chapter of Ephesians. Throughout the campaign against intemperance one thing among others that impressed him most was the fact that the forces arrayed against pro-hibition were spiritual. "We wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities and powers of the air." We see so much of the human, we hear the human value and feel the grip hear the human voice and feel the grip of the human hand, that we sometimes feel that we are struggling with the human, but we are not. Behind all the forces is the great unseen host marshaled by the prince of the power of the air. These forces are organized under one giant intellect. Satan lies in wait to deceive. In the great struggle with the liquor traffic, in as much as our real foes are spiritual, our resources must also be spiritual, spirit must wrestle with spirit.

"We have been trying to do," continued the speaker, "what the friends tried to do with the man possessed of many devils. They bound him with fetters, but he broke the chains; he was beyond their control. We try to regulate and restrain and fetter the liquor traffic, and we become disheart-ened. We conquer it today but it bobs up serenely tomorrow. I go back to the time when they brought the young man possessed of the devil to Christ, and he cast it out. They asked the Saviour why they were not able to do it, and he told them that it was be-It, and he told them that it was because of their unbelief. I believe that if we put the emphasis where it ought to be, namely, on prayer, our end and aim will be easily attained." The weapons of warfare, the speaker went on to say, are not carnal; they are spiritual. The enemies of the cause of prohibition will hold in contempt those who kneel in prayer. Amid the those who kneel in prayer. Amid the activities of our Christian life today are many who are in danger of losing sight of the power of prayer. In con-clusion, Mr. Bishop emphasized the ne-cessity of carrying on the campaign in a prayerful spirit.

MR. McDERMID. swering the question "Does Probibito make a proper discrimination between effective prohibition and annihilation. Prohibition in the sense of annihilation is a failure, but to say prohibition in the more reasonable ac-ceptation of the term is a failure would be to condemn the laws of Mount

Sinai as failures. Mr. McDermid went on to show that conditions under prohibition were much more to be desired than under license law. Taking for example the State of Maine, he stated the opinions of 140 representative citizens, including politicians, sheriffs, state legislators, journalists, farmers, clergymen, and so on, had been obtained, and of this number 132 stated that open saloons were unknown; pauperism was on the decrease; 75 per cent of the governors of Maine during her half century stated that crime had steadily de-

The speaker went on to show that laws might be enforced though public sentiment were opposed to enforcement. He mentioned the law of imprisonment for debt which had at one time been rigidly enforced in spite of the fact that public sentiment was decidedly against it. In the early history of Canada the law regarding the solemnizing of marriage by Episco-palian clergymen only was strictly enforced, though the majority of the people were opposed to it. Objectionable laws remained in force long after public sentiment had turned against

The speaker criticized the stand taken by the New York Outlook in a recent issue on the enforcement of law. Gur customs duties law is one which is practically enforced, though if put to popular vote it would be overwhelmingly voted down. Men would claim the right to buy in the cheapest and sell in the dearest market without being molested. The sentiment is just as strong in regard to the manufacture as to the sale of intoxicating liquors, yet the law in regard to the manufacture is strictly observed. It is in the interest of the Government and of the distiller that it should be. So the in-dustry is confined to a few men. "Sentiment," said the speaker, "has practically nothing to do with the violation or enforcement of law. Great majorities pronounce for honesty in elections, yet political frauds are personated every time almost that an election occurs

The law is violated, and only winked The law and its enforcement are two different things. The policeman and the magistrate do not, in performing their duties, take into consideration the sentiment of the people; nor does the judge on the bench advise the jurors to take into consideration the probable effect

of public sentiment. As a test of public sentiment a referendum would be false. The first plebiscite was the best indication of the opinion of the country in regard to the liquor traffic. The second was mislead-ing, and a third appeal, the speaker contended, would be simply playing into the hands of the liquor element. In conclusion, he stated that prohibitionists should protest against those newspapers which are throwing bad ethics before the people, and some of our religious periodicals were as guilty in this respect as the secular press.
