SEVENTH REGIMENT'S OPENING DRILL WAS WELL ATTENDED

Men Present a Fine Appearance—The Rifle Matches On Thanksgiving Day.

SEVERAL things there were for the officers to be proud of when the opening drill of the season of the Seventh Regiment took place in the drill shed last night. As a general thing, the opening drill is but indifferently attended, but last night the men of the Seventh were out in force. Then there was the quality of the troops to be proud of, for though many of them were "green"—last night being their first experience in the ranks—they displayed a splendid appearance, being physically a fine lot of men. for several years, and recently promoted from the rank of corporal.

the boys of the crack regiment to be marked that in his many years' experience he had never observed as much glimmer or get-up-and-go in the men as he had last night.

Immediately the men were sent through the evolutions of the drill, responding quickly to the word of command, even the recruits acting like seasoned soldiers. Once in a while in company drill, the lines as the men marched across the asphalt would be somewhat warped, but as the evening progressed and the militiamen felt more at ease, the companies presented an exceptionally fine appearance.

If next Monday night be at all favorable, a route march will be held, and the citizens will be given an opportunity of seeing the regiment on the streets.

Colonel Little, Captain and Paymaster Reid and Major Cronyn all expressed themselves as highly pleased with last night's drill.

THURSDAY'S SHOOT.

The Seventh Rifle Association matches, which will take place at the rifle ranges, on Thanksgiving Day, are of deep interest to the men of the regiment. So far, the officers and citizens in general have been very generous in the way of donations, and Major Hayes has collected to date between \$100 and \$500. The events on the programme for Thursday include a match for trophies for the cup and medal given by the mayor, the winner's name to be engraved on the cup and the medal to be the property of the winner. There are also 10 cash prizes, running from \$7 to \$1.

In the recreational match, open to members of the regiment, there are 40 prizes, from \$8 to \$1.

In the corporation match, for the City of London medal, there are 25 prizes, from \$7 to \$1.

There are ten prizes in the grand aggregate match, from \$5 to \$1.

One of the best features of the day will be the rapid fire match, in which seven shots must be fired in one minute, competitors to reload every shot. There are 24 prizes for this match, running from \$5 to \$1.

The company match will be for the Charles Cup, and four prizes of \$6, \$4, \$2 and \$2.

Possibly the above several events will take place for several days.
