Whatever may be the solution, it is a strange fact that the shot came from the Bourse Esplanade, where was sta-tioned the First Horse Artillery of the Guard, the premier artillery organization of the empire, and one of the most noted regiments in the whole Russian service. It is clear, however, the saluting was done mos recklessly, as the flashes of the blank shots from St. Peter and St. Paul fortress showed that the guns were direct ed straight at the winter palace.






