Mr. Frank Lawson introduced Mr. Sing, who greatly delighted his audience.

Speaking of some of the facts he had learned since coming to America, some five months ago, Mr. Sing said that the first great fact impressed on his mind was that a man becomes young when he is nine years of age, and that he remains young until he reaches the age of ninety-nine years. He then went on to say that he believed this to be the great age for young men, and that in saying this he was remembering, with all deference, the young men who had reached the ninety-nine year

Mr. Sing then spoke at some length of the opinion which most Occidental people have of the people of the Orient. He said the general opinion has been that the people of the far east are of a conservative, unaggressive character; but he wished to present a different picture of the Orient, which has undergone great changes since forty years ago, when it may have been deserving of such comments as those made by Occidental writers. As an example of the marked changes which have been transpiring in the far Decide to Merge Provincial and east, Mr. Sing pointed to the great Russo-Japan war, the result of which was such a

surprise to the whole world. Before the war the people of India were living in constant dread of Russia, and had spent annually \$30,000,000 for the past sixty years in safeguarding their country against possible invasion by the Russians, whom they looked upon as being invincible. But after the war they found that they had been spending these great sums of money to protect themselves from a great ghost. They realized their own power, they gained selfrespect and self-confidence. Where they once stood in awe of the Occidental powers they now feel that, if need be, they can protect themselves against them. Speaking of the "Yellow Peril" sentiment he said that the people of the far east

are essentially a peace-loving people, and that they have no bad fire in their blood which would cause them to invade the countries of the Occident for the simple pleasure of conquering other nations or gaining spoils. The remaining 95 pupils whose choice Mr. Sing pointed out that the power un-
