THE FIRST GAME
WITH THE SCOTSScores Made By Six Rinks in the
First Day's Play.

At Glasgow, on Jan. 22, the Canadians played their first game at Crossmyloof on artificial ice. Six rinks a side engaged for a two-days' contest.

The Canadians arrived in a body at Crossmyloof Station at 8:45, and immediately proceeded to the rink adjoining. They marched in a body, and were received individually by Mr. Hamilton, the ex-chairman of the company, what time the band of the rink played an appropriate fantasia of Scottish and Canadian airs. Thereafter the party proceeded to the lower end of the rink, where the Scotchmen of the Royal Caledonian Curling Club, extended a hearty welcome to the visitors, Mr. Robertson, Winnipeg, replying. Play was commenced at once, and after preparatory throws, the curlers settled down in earnest.

Each side was represented by six rinks, and as it was impossible for the whole of the visitors or rink members to take part at once, the arrangement was made that players who did not curl in the forenoon should have an opportunity of displaying their powers later in the day, when the second match took place.

The ice was keen, and though the matches took place under cover the enthusiasm of the players was in no way affected. There were the usual demonstrations associated with the "roarin' game," the noisy urging of players, the rattle and clashing of the stones, and the nimble skipping figures "sooping" with hasty energy. But the "clash of old Glasgow" was not much in evidence—there were no klutts, knickers supplanted them—and the few broad bonnets were in a hopeless minority with the modern tweed caps.

At half-time this forenoon the local players led by the substantial majority of 14, but a peculiar point, so far as actual rink wins were concerned, the players engaged could cry "peels"—the Canadians had beaten three local rinks, and the locals had accounted for three Canadian rinks. DRISCOLL COULDN'T
PUT LANGDON OUTQuaker Takes Good Beating and
Surprises Crowd by His
Aggressiveness.

Philadelphia, Feb. 2.—Jem Driscoll, of England, beat Tommy Langdon, of Philadelphia, before the Washington A. A. here tonight in a six-round tilt. The Briton won all the way, but Langdon astonished every one of the fight fans by his showing. In games alone was he a match for the Englishman. The Quaker boy was always willing to take a chance and stood up to his opponent manfully.

Driscoll proved a marvel of the first hands and showed as fancy an assortment of sidestepping, blocking and ducking as Philadelphia has seen in a long while. From the first round to the end he maintained a safe lead over his rival, but not until the latter joined him up a bit in the fourth did the Englishman cut loose.

Then he sallied in hammer and tongs and tried for a knockout. He almost succeeded, too, for one of his vicious right hooks caught Langdon on the ear near the end of the sixth round, and sent the Philadelphia man staggering to the ropes. Driscoll was unable to pursue his advantage, as Langdon worked into a clinch and stalled till the bell.

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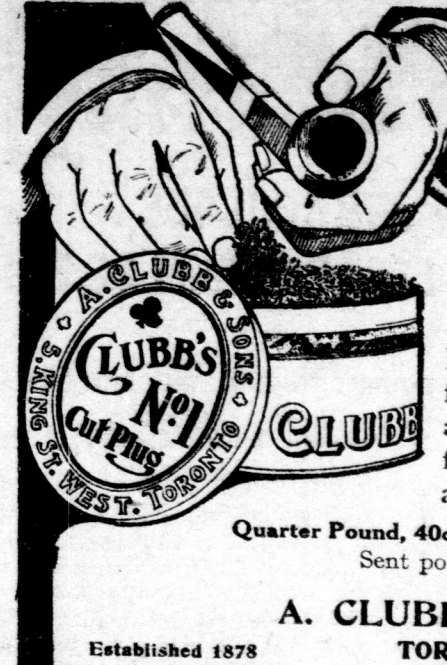
