ADVISORY BOARD
IDEA IS DROPPED
Withdrawn After Hearing the Views of the Premiers.
SIR WILFRID'S VIEW
Canadian Premier Points Out That Matters Are Better as They Present.

London, June 8. — The Imperial Conference resumed consideration of Mr. Lewis Harcourt's proposal for a standing committee. The colonial secretary, since the previous week's discussion, had circulated among the members of the conference a memorandum stating that the standing committee would in effect be a subsidiary conference meeting at more or less regular intervals for the transaction of all business referred to it by the secretary for the colonies with the assent of the dominion governments. It had been by no means uncommon for governments to nominate and use an advisory committee as an aid to administration. Ministers continued Mr. Lewis Harcourt's proposal, which was a method for securing the interchange of views among public departments and commercial interests, and the view of the opinion expressed by the committee. Mr. Lewis Harcourt proposed that the committee consist of the secretary for the colonies, the parliamentary and permanent under-secretaries for the colonies, the secretary to the imperial conference, the high commissioners of Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, a representative from Newfoundland, and the secretary to the committee.

Proceeding, Mr. Harcourt said that while it was not desirable at the outset to define too precisely the duties of such a committee, it must be advisory, not executive. There was, therefore, no necessity to confer voting powers on its members. The committee must deal only with matters concerning the past conference or the preparations for an approaching one. It would be the dominion governments to be consulted through the governors-general as to their willingness to submit questions to the committee. It would be unnecessary to keep any detailed minutes of the proceedings. Mr. Harcourt wound up the memorandum by reiterating that the Imperial Government did not desire to press the appointment of the standing committee upon the dominions, they were unwilling to accept the proposal. The Government, however, was of opinion that such a standing committee would be of great advantage in securing efficiency in the work of the business of the secretariat and conference. Sir Joseph Ward, premier of New Zealand, and Premier Fisher, of Australia, approved the proposal, General Botha dissenting.

Sir Wilfrid's Views.
Sir Wilfrid Laurier said he would view with serious apprehension the interference of any body whatever between the Home Government and the governments of the dominions. He adhered to the position he took up four years ago, that the relations between the dominions and the mother country should be carried on by themselves. The organization of the colonial office had given ample satisfaction. He thought they should leave matters as they were at present.

Home Government Not Anxious.
Mr. Harcourt said he never contemplated that the members of the committee ultimately should be members of the conference. It was clear, however, that the conference was not sufficiently unanimous to make it worth while to proceed further with the proposal. a comparatively short time, but the case was very different with Australia and New Zealand. The idea seemed to prevail among those opposing the proposal that if they agreed to it, it was going to help towards the establishment of an imperial council, which, he thought, would come in any case, but only when public opinion was ripe for such a reform. The proposal for an imperial council would not be put forward now, but any decision on the present question. Premier Botha said that no government would allow itself to be ruled by such a committee. The creation of such a committee might be a false step leading more to breaking down than to building up. They must hasten slowly. The Home Government had taken the prime ministers into their confidence on all subjects. That was a step in the right direction. Laurier, however, would not proceed further with the proposal.

SARNIA CO. WORKMEN
DROWNED IN LAKE PENAG
A Heavily Laden Canoe Submerged During a Squall.
Sudbury Ont., June 9.—Archibald Tull, aged 31; Jack Hunter, 26, and George Girard, 20, were drowned in Lake Penag on Monday. They were crossing the lake with Thomas Chambers and another man in a Peterborough canoe, when a squall sprang up. The heavily laden canoe filled with water. The men clung to it, but the three mentioned became exhausted. Mr. Tull, Mr. Chambers and the other man sank, and drifted ashore, after being in the water about two hours. Mr. Tull, who came from England a few years ago, lived in Webbwood, and leaves a young widow and a week-old child. Hunter came from Burk's Falls, and Girard from Arden. All three were employed on the Cleveland-Sarnia Lumber Company's drive. The bodies were recovered.

Maine French-Canadian Association Clashes With the Church.

Biddeford, Me., June 9.—Resolutions indorsing the recent unsuccessful attempt to secure legislation for the dissolution of the corporation, by which Bishop Louis S. Walsh, Catholic bishop of Portland, is given complete charge of the \$16,000,000 worth of property owned by the Catholic Church of Maine, was adopted by the annual convention of the Maine Cause Nationale, yesterday, at which delegates from Quebec were in attendance. The resolutions also say: "We recommend a further appeal to the next legislative assembly to stop the numerous and crying abuses of which the French-American Catholics of this diocese have been and now are complaining, any of which the corporation sole is the principal cause."
