### Blind May Hear Light

London, June 24 .- Dr. Fournier d'Albe, a lecturer on physics at Birmingham University, will demonstrate tomorrow at the optical convention at South Kensington an instrument called the optophone, which is designed to enable those who are totally blind to locate and estimate light by means of the ear. The instrument is based on the property of selenium of changing its resistance when it is illuminated. This change is made to cause a current which, when interrupted by a special contrivance and transmitted through telephone receivers fitted to the head, gives an audible sound varying in loudness with the intensity of the light. The blind are enabled to locate lamps in windows and other high lights and to trace the outlines of large, welldefined objects. The instrument makes the moonlight distinctly audible and sunlight a roaring
