LONDON POUNDED RENFER

We have a growing suspicion that Mr. Shaughnessy will be intensely relieved when he gets out of this particular section of the Canadian League circuit. The atmosphere appears to be one of base hits and runs, but the strange part of it is none of them seem to come in any large quantities to the Shaughnessy team. Yesterday it appeared as if the Senators were really going to cop a game and put one bright ray of sunshine into a week of dark gloom, but Mr. Bierbauer, who holds a job with Mr. Deneau as a first sacker, positively refused to allow any such occurrence. He formed a most peculiar habit of driving in runs with long hits after the visitors had succeeded in retiring two of the local fence busters. Four of the London runs were due to Bierbauer, while the errors which Renfer accounted largely for the others. The score was 2 to 2, with London on the heavy end.

FITZ PITCHED GOOD BALL.

Jack Fitzpatrick occupied the knoll for the home folks, and after the first inning he had the former champs swinging like a bunch of gates on a windy evening. Only four hits were piled from Fitz's offering, and two of these came in the opening chapter. The other two were scattered and completely overlooked as far as the result of the game was concerned.

Ed Renfer was Shaughnessy's choice, and the locals swung up on the said Ed for a few things that he did to them last season. He pounded his offerings to all portions of the scenery and had little difficulty in getting round the bats. London's hits were mostly of the timely variety, especially those credited to Bierbauer, although Ottawa errors often made it possible for runs to score.

It was the largest ladies' day of the season and the attendance was something over 100. Last season ladies' day was a fiasco for London, but this year they have played splendid ball on these days and have won all their games so far.

Although Mr. Bierbauer did most heavily on the Renfer delivery, "Lad" Stewart also helped with telling effect on the same delivery. Dad got three hits in four times at bat, and his third run to the plate was the only one that counted. The other hits were divided up singly among the rest of the players. Linnborn and Myers being the only ones who did not connect safely.

Clickenger's Nice Catches. Clickenger, the Columbus Chapter, was also prominent in the proceedings. Click pulled off a couple of nice catches in left garden, and thoroughly prevented a block of runs. In the sixth he made a nice running catch of Lage's long fly close down Renfer's drive with a leap and one-hand stab at the ball. Two men were on bases, and the catch was a great one. Renfer swung the ball terrifically. It was travelling for the fence when Clickenger swooped in and snatched it. A couple of minutes later Click came up to bat and pitched the ball to deep centre for two outs. It was a great day for the big fellow.

George Dunlop, our dazzling shortstop, had three errors during the happenings, but George will be excused if he can work like he did yesterday every day in the season. Nothing was too hard for him to go after, and he was picking lightning drives out of the dust at all angles. His throwing was a little off, however, and all his errors were wild ones.

Ottawa started off as if it intended to be a real contender in the struggle, but two runs were over the plate before the crowd was largely aware that the game had started. But it was merely a flash in the pan. Shaughnessy's followers playing their whole game in that one

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Jules Goux, of France, Won
Indianapolis Speedway Race

Bobby Burman Forced to Drop Out After Leading for 140 Miles—American Car Finished Second—Only One Accident During Race.

Indianapolis, May 30.—In a great race, whose most spectacular feature was the finish of the car that came home third—that car, driven by Jules Goux, of France, the Peugeot, French-made machine, the Peugeot, won first place in the annual 500 miles speedway contest here today. He led all the way after Bob Burman, in the Detroit-made Keeton, was practically forced out of the contest, after being in front for the first 140 miles. Goux finished the race in 6:31:33.45, a little more than ten minutes slower than Joe Dawson's time of last year, and averaged 75.5 miles per hour for the grind.

Wishart Was Second. American and foreign cars divided the first four places. Spencer Wishart, in a Mercer, was second, nearly fourteen minutes behind Goux. Chas. Merz, a German driver, handling an American car, the Stutz, was third, and the fourth car, a Sunbeam, driven by Albert Guyot, is an English machine, with a Frenchman at the wheel. There were ten prize moneys, and four of the eight foreign cars that started got into the list, with six of the nine American machines getting shares.

Burman Set New Record. Bobby Burman, in a Keeton, Detroit's only representative, who led for 140

miles, and established a new record for 100 miles for cars of its class, did not finish in the money, accidents putting him out of it.

Goux Wins Big Sum. Goux, by his performance, enriches himself directly, apart from what the victory means to him in the future, to the extent of \$25,000. First money in the race is \$20,000. In addition, he gets the Wheeler & Schebler trophy, worth \$10,000; the Prestolite trophy, and the Remy trophy, each of the two latter being valued at \$2,500. These three prizes are offered to the car finishing first, respectively, at the 400, 300 and 200 miles stages of the long journey. Second money in the race is \$10,000; third, \$5,000; fourth, \$3,500; fifth, \$2,000; sixth, \$2,000; seventh, \$1,500; eighth, \$1,000; ninth, \$1,500; tenth, \$1,000.

Wishart Gets Additional Prize. Spencer Wishart, who finished second, and gets \$10,000 of the Speedway prize money for that feat, tonight was given an additional cash prize, amount not stated, for his performance in landing an American car second to the winner. All of the drivers who came out the big end of the coin were popular, more so, the Frenchman, Guyot, than any of the three who beat him out. This was because of numerous brushes that he had with other cars in front of the grandstands, which he passed at marvellous speed, demonstrating wonderful control of his machine. Burman's failure was regretted.

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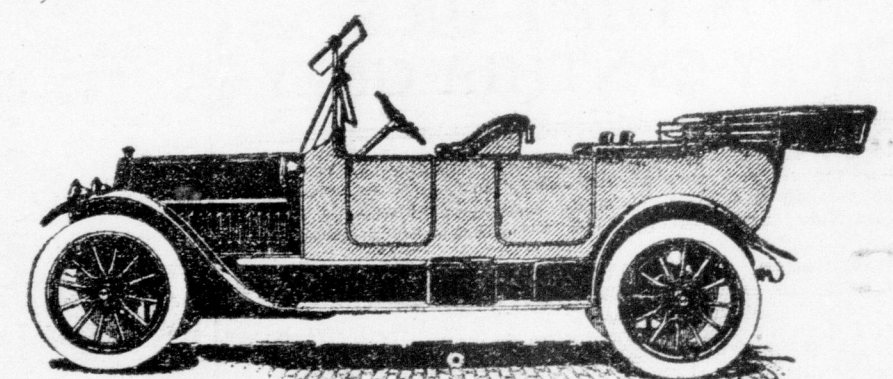
