



QUALITY STORE SAYS BOARD OF HEALTH

Dr. Burdon Declares It Is Criticized for Not Allowing Meds to Visit Isolation Hospital.

Of the seven smallpox cases in the Cove Hospital, one is a medical student. Another student was released a short time ago. Both of them are fourth year men at the Western Medical College. Censured for Caution.

"We received considerable censure for not letting all the meds. go down to the isolation hospital to study and examine smallpox patients some time ago," said Dr. F. L. Burdon, at the board of health meeting yesterday. "Two of them have been sick with the disease; their boarding-houses have been quarantined. If they had all gone down to the hospital, no doubt they would have spread the disease all through the city.'

"Five years ago," declared Dr. Hutchinson, "there was an agitation against vaccination. The children have grown up without vaccination, and now we are getting results. All of the pronounced smallpox cases now have not been vaccinated which, according to Dr. Hutchinson, proves his theories about such treatment, which he said he strongly recomnanded five years ago. Six Cases of Diphtheria.

Dr. Hutchinson reported that there are six cases of diphtheria and two cases of scarlet fever in the city. One of the smallpox patients will be out of the hospital this week, leaving only six. A. M. Hunt, secretary of the Western Fair Board, in a letter read at the meeting, in answer to one sent to the Western Fair regarding the public conveniences at Queen's Park, said: "We have nothing whatever to do with the lavatories until
