RUSSIAN GENERAL ESCAPES FROM AUSTRIAN PRISON

Petrograd, Sept. 9 .- Via London. General Korniloff, formerly commander of the 48th Russian Division, who was aptured by the Austro-Germans in Galicia in May, 1918, escaped from the prison camp in which he was held in Austria and has arrived at Bucharest, t is announced by the semi-official news agency. The Russian general reached the capital of Rumania after a month of adventures in his trip across Hungary, walking by night and hiding Frequently he had to go without food for days.


