





CANADA IS MAKING PREPARATIONS FOR BISLEY SHOOT

Usual Conditions Cover Preliminary Shoot At Rockliffe Ranges.

OTTAWA, Jan. 13 .- The Dominion of Canada Rifle Association will send a epresentative rifle team to the National Rifle Association competitions at Bisley this year, arrangements being pow under way for its selection. Each provincial rifle association will be lasked to select one or more men, according to plan decided upon, but the final decision as to the composition of the team will be left to a committee of the Dominion Association. All members of the team must conform to the age limit of the C. E. F., which in the case of N. C. O.'s and men is 45 years.

The annual business meeting of the D. C. R. A. will be held in Ottawa on Friday, February 27, at 11 o'clock in the morning, when the officers for the coming year will be selected.

The Dominion of Canada Rifie Association will resume its annual prize competition at Rockliffe range this summer when a full week's shooting will commence on August 16. The only ritie permitted in the regular competitions will be the short M. Lee-Enfield with sights as issued. This is the service rifle, and is the same as is to be used at the Bisley matches in England in July. 
