# SHIPPING OUTLOOK IMPROVES;

Little Trouble Experienced in New York As Yet-Printers' Efforts For 44-Hour Week Brings Out 4,500 Men-Reports Show Minor Strikes Still Being Called.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 3.-Repening of negotiations between the United States Shipping Board and marine workers in an effort to settle the wage dispute, which threatens a tieup of United States shipping, was indicated as probable today by Chairman Benson, who announced that a conference of all the parties to the

Negotiations to draft an amendment covering wages and working conditions came to an abrupt end last Friday with the refusal of the men to accept a 15 per cent wage cut, later made effective by the board. The men carried their case to President Harding. who turned the matter over to Secretaries Davis and Hoover. The latter have held conferences with union eaders in an attempt to bring about an agreement by conciliation. Situation Hopeful.

Since yesterday, Chairman Benson said, the whole problem has been directly in the hands of Secretary Davis. very hopeful.

Reports to the shipping board today from all districts, officials said, indicated that as far as ship movement was concerned, the situation was generally satisfactory.

In New York, however, officials said, some difficulty was being experienced. as strikers were picketting the board's recruiting offices, and in Baltimore the situation seemed rather unsatisfactory.

To Start Court Battle Over Act Compelling Them to Keep Books in Other Languages.

Manila, May 3.-Chinese merchants of he Philippine Islands have decided t test through the courts here the con stitutionality of the law passed by the recent session of the Legislature, requiring all merchants to keep their ooks in English. Spanish or one of the books in English. Spanish or one of the dialects of the Philippine Islands. Failing in this course, it was announced through the Chinese consul-general, Kow Hsien Chow, that a protest would be made to the United States Congress.

Mr. Kow, in a statement, said he had received advices from Chinese merchants all over the islands, as well as Manila, telling of their probable de-parture from the Philippines unless some way can be found to prevent the enforcement of the law.

Treaty Violations Alleged.

Consul-General Kow pointed out that the bookkeeping law violates treaties between countries, including those be-tween the United States and China. He said the constitution of the United States and the various treaties, including the treaty with China, accord to foreigners who desire to reside in the United States and do business there, exactly the same treatment as the citizens of the United States would themselves receive, and the only power that can pass a law that would interfere with the rights of aliens who desire to enter the United States and do busiess there would be the United States In a letter to the governor-general,


