Resident of Clinton, Mich., and  
Member Well-Known London  
Family, Buried Thursday.

Many Londoners were included among the friends of the late Harry S. Barnard of Clinton, Mich., and heard with great regret of his death in a Detroit hospital on Tuesday, March 4. Mr. Barnard came of a large London family, many of whose members have left the city in recent years to reside in Michigan. His father was Mr. Harry Barnard of Detroit; his uncle also lived here of one time. London relatives are: Miss Tillie Barnard, of the Bell Telephone Company, and Mr. Charles Barnard, of the postal department.

Mr. Barnard had been in poor health for some time, but his condition grew rapidly worse during the early part of February. The cause of his illness, at first obscure, was later found to be a cold, which, on and on Tuesday, March 4, bronchial pneumonia developed, bringing about his sudden death.

Mr. Barnard was born in Detroit, and of late years has held a responsible position as foreign buyer for the K. I. & N. Co., of Chicago. He was compelled to resign this position through ill health in 1915, and moved to a farm near Clinton.

Funeral services were held in the First Presbyterian Church, Detroit, of which Mr. Barnard had been a member, on the Thursday following his death, and were conducted on Friday afternoon in the Congregational Church, Clinton. Masonic services were conducted in the Riverside Chapel, where interment was made.

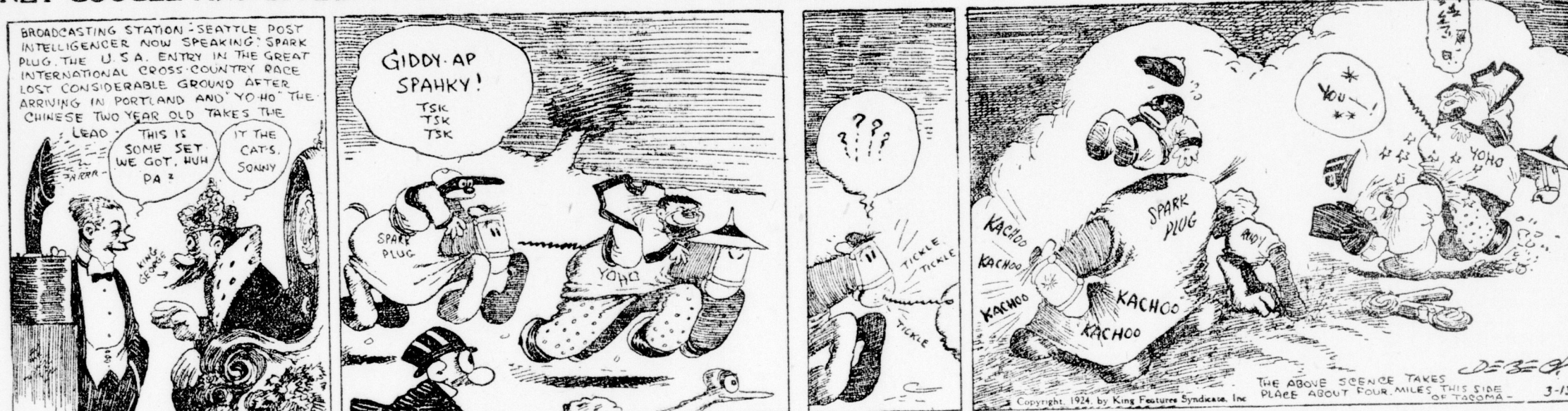
Every member of the cast has had a wide experience in previous amateur theatricals and rehearsals have already reached the stage where the entire three acts go through without a hitch.

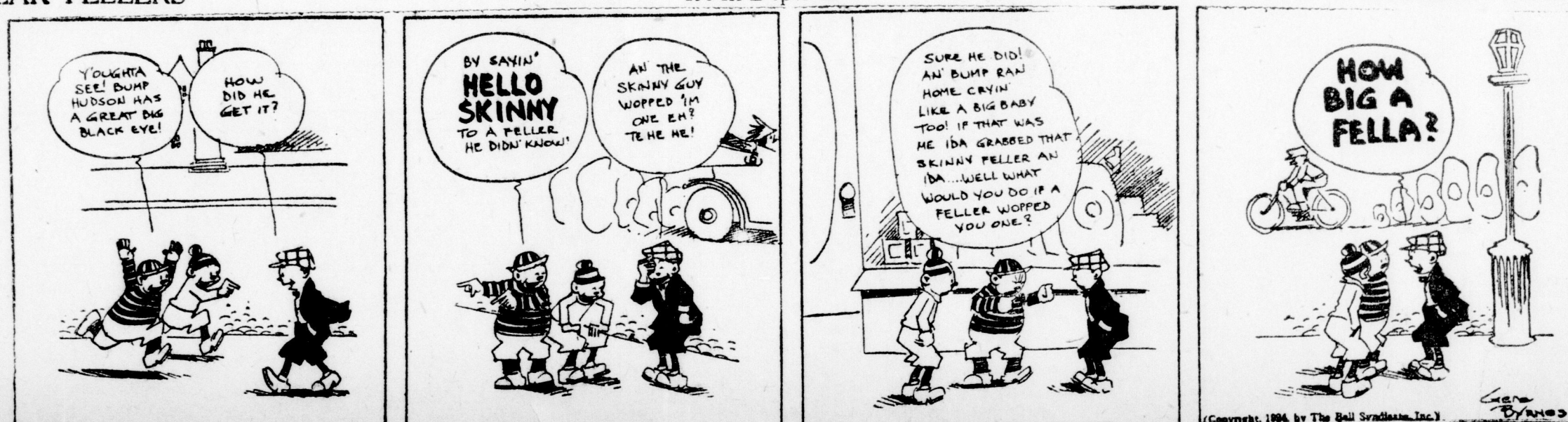
