Fort William, Feb. 10.—Only another million bushels was added to the stocks of grain in store at the head of the lakes during the past week, the total now standing at 57.58,676 bushels, of which three and a half million bushels are afloat aboard vessels here. This amount is 22,000 bushels more than was in store here a year ago today, and some of the elevators are depending almost entirely upon the rail shipments for their capacity to take in any more grain.


