The argument was advanced from the pulpit of a city church a mile and a-half, and then turned that the minister would not deliver milk on Sunday, neither would he allow one of Wood's beautiful grounds and finishthe members of his family to do so, and, therefore, he did not wish others to do what he would not willingly and conscientiously do himself. I like that kind of argument, or "Do unto others as you would others do unto you." But he also states that the milkman could in cases of necessity take a little tin pail of milk and heave it on the doorston as he was on and leave it on the doorstep as he was on his way to church. But how is the milkman to know of cases of necessity that may arise between his delivery on Saturday and the following Sunday, and what relief from Sabbath toil would it afford him to go about on Sunday morning on his way to church with a half dozen little tin pails dangling from his person? This, as well as other plans suggested, would fall little short of the ridiculous if put in actual practice. It is easier to devise plans from the pulpit than to carry them into practice on a milk route. I have had petitions presented to me for signature to cease Sunday delivery for six months of the year. Those petitions are being circulated by milkmen who claim they can dispense with Sunday delivery during the cold weather. As a dairyman, I could meet the demand for Sunday's supply of milk in the summer when it is abundant better than I could in the win-Besides, cows are cows, and you cannot bribe them to give Sunday's supply on Saturday at one season of the year more than another. But, further, if it is wrong to deliver milk on Sunday for six months of the year it is wrong for twelve; then, if the object is Sabbath observance and not merely personal convenience, why not come out flat-footed and ask for a by-law to prohibit the sale of milk all the year round? If the agitation is based on principle, and sacrifices must be made, then there be no half measures, and let what is condemned for six months of the r be pronounced wrong for the other and let the Sunday sale of milk be year be disallowed and discontinued altogether. I would favor a straight, honest regula-tion of that kind even at some sacrifice. rather than a six months' shift such as the milk dealers propose, by means of which they lose nothing and add to their personal comfort, while the entire loss would fall upon the dairyman. If the public are prepared to dispense with Sunday delivery, they must even during the winter months content themselves with at least sweet milk if not sour milk; for even though sweet it cannot be fresh unless delivered to the cou-sumer as the cow delivers it to the dairyman, viz.: daily. If the public demand fresh milk for their Sunday supply I know of no milk preservatives or other means of furnishing the genuine article other than Sunday delivery. If the Sunday sup-ply were the moral evil that it is some-times represented to be, nature, "the serof Providence," would herself have provided a remedy, and it may be that the milk vendor, pursuing his rounds on the Sabbath morning and min-istering to the health and preservation of the community, is not only a useful and an honorable servant of the public, but does his duty in a spirit as much in keeping with a due regard and veneration for the Sabbath as his more fortunate but pretentious fellows, who unite in de-ploring in the Sunday sanctuary the evils of the trade.






