REVOLUTIONARY OUTBREAKS IN GREEK TOWNS Rumanians Continue Triumphant Drive into Hungary

All Interest Now Centred Upon Balkans and Germany

Britain Wondering What Hindenburg Will Do. Rumanian Move Surprises. Central Powers Not Believed Prepared for Move. Bulgaria is a Puzzle. Belief Expressed That Ferdinand Is Prepared to Abdicate Throne.

LONDON, September 1.—The whole interest in the war is now focused on the Balkans, and the German field marshal, Von Hindenburg, Rumania's participation is considered here important not only from the accession of a new, fresh army, but from the opportunity it gives the Russian army to extend its base and to co-operate with Rumania upon Galician and Transylvanian territory practically as one army against the Austrians.
