THE SEALING QUESTION.

Lord Salisbury Nominates Two British Representatives on the Behring Sea Arbitration.

The North American Commercial Company Objects to the Order Prohibiting Hunting.

LONDON, June 19.—Lord Salisbury has nominated the two British representatives on the Behring Sea arbitration commission, subject to the queen's approval.

WASHINGTON CITY, June 19.—The North American Commercial Company, through their attorney, Judge Jeffries, has filed a protest with the treasury department. It states that it was issued a quota of 60,000 sealskins during 1890, and upon this assurance made a large outfit. It was compelled to cease taking seals July 20, last, when the season had not expired and only one-third of the net quota of skins had been obtained.

On this account the company submits a loss of \$40,000. It again submits a formal protest against the action of the United States in preventing the taking of the full quota of seals. It gives notice to the secretary of treasury that it will not be reimbursed by the United States to the full amount of the loss it may sustain by reason of its being prohibited from taking the seals of the Behring Sea. It also states that the company has expended \$150,000, for which it has not been reimbursed.

The company invites the attention of the Secretary of the Treasury to the fact that the islands of St. Paul and St. George are in the undisputed possession of the United States, and that the right of the Government to dispose of fur seals on the said islands has never been questioned. This being so, the company assumes that the right of the United States or its lessee to take fur seals on the said islands within the limits of the Behring Sea is not a disputed question, and that the company is not subject to interference by any foreign state. The right of the Government to take fur seals on its own territory is not one of the questions to be decided by the arbitration. HENRY CLEW'S, N. Y. CIRCULAR.

The New York financial circular for the week ending June 15, issued by Henry Clew & Co., reports that events during the week were mostly of a favorable character, and the situation abroad shows further satisfactory improvement.

The best evidence of this was the decline in gold shipments and the rise in the Bank of England's proportion of reserve to liabilities from 44.35 per cent. to 46.06 per cent. in a week. The bank now holds about \$2,000,000 gold more than at this time in 1870, and is in a much better position to meet all probable demands than was thought possible a few weeks ago. Whatever sums may be withdrawn by Russia, they will shortly be drawn again in debt payments. The bank rate is 4 per cent., but in open market the rate is 2 1/2 per cent., suggesting a further decline in the official rate. Another indication of reviving confidence in London was the failure of the joint stock banks to support the Bank of England in maintaining discount rates.

The favorable progress of the Baring liquidation also exerted a good effect, and the outlook is much brighter than in March or April. Paris and Berlin are still in some degree of uncertainty, but the situation is naturally reported there as a result of improvement in London. The bank reserves are in good shape, and each year the West shows itself less and less dependent upon the East for money, and the coming fall may prove no exception. The certainty of an abundant harvest at home and a deficient one abroad increases each day. The increase in Winter wheat acreage is 11.6 per cent., and in Spring wheat 3.4 per cent., while the condition of both stands at a high average of 96.6 per cent. and 92.6 per cent. respectively. Money continues easy, and promises to so continue until the crop movement, the present quietness of trade, tending to increase supplies.

THE ICY BAY DISASTER.

Particulars of the Drowning of Lieut Robinson and Four of the Bear's Crew.

Only One Man Out of the Boat's Crew Succeeded in Reaching Shore.

The Alaskan of June 13th furnishes the following details of the sad occurrence in Icy Bay, which resulted in the drowning of Lieut. Robinson and four seamen of the revenue cutter Bear, and Mr. W. C. Moore, of the Russell exploring party.

The Bear left Port Townsend on May 30th, having on board, in addition to her regular complement of officers and crew, Rev. Dr. Sheldon Jackson, Judge and Mrs. Louis H. Tarpley, and the exploring party in charge of Prof. I. C. Russell. Captain Healy had instructions from the Secretary of the Treasury to land the Russell party at Icy Bay, about 40 miles west from Yakutat. The cutter arrived at Yakutat Bay on Thursday, June 4th, and on the following day landed part of Professor Russell's stores to be cached at the head of Disenchantment Bay in anticipation of his return there in August next. Thence the Bear proceeded to Icy Bay where she arrived on Saturday morning at 10 o'clock. Preparations were immediately made to land the explorers and their stores, the surf looking from where the ship rode at anchor as if a landing could be easily effected. The first boat to leave the vessel was in charge of Lieut. D. H. Jarvis; it was lightly loaded. The boat took the lead and met with no serious difficulty with the exception of being swamped near the beach and filling with water. But they appeared to be no danger and the men and stores were safely landed. The second boat was in command of Lieut. L. B. Robinson, and contained W. C. Moore, of Prof. Russell's party, Boat-Coxswain J. Haasler, Seaman A. Nelson, T. O. Anderson and H. Smith. This boat capsized outside the surf line, about 50 yards from shore, in deep water, too far away to enable the party already landed to render any assistance to the struggling men, who, for some unexplained reason, had let go their hold on the boat, and were making vain attempts to swim shoreward. Only one man (J. Wright) was saved, he coming to the beach, clinging to a log of drift against which the incoming surf beat and drove before it with the clinging sailor. The man had swallowed a great quantity of salt water, and was brought back to his normal condition with much difficulty. Diligent search was made by Lieut. Jarvis for those bodies as might drift in, but there were only two recovered; one being the corpse of the seaman (Anderson) badly mutilated, and the other, that of Lieut. Robinson. How and why this second boat upset is one of those peculiar mysteries of the sea which is inexplicable. It can only be accounted for by the hypothesis of some counter current meeting immediately beneath the boat, or of some wild change of the ocean's surface unlooked for, and impossible to avert. Lieut. Jarvis remained on the beach until the next day when Anderson's body was buried in the sand, and the body of Robinson was returned to the cutter. The additional landings were safely made subsequent to the disaster, and Prof. Russell, his party, their stores and instruments, were successfully put ashore. LONDON, June 19.—The inquest on the body of the little girl, Barbara Waterhouse, whose dismembered remains were recently found wrapped up in a bundle, near the town hall of Leeds, has developed some sensational evidence. Mrs. Cotterill, a lady who for seventeen years has been a friend of the Turner family, was the chief witness to-day. She testified that on the Wednesday after the murder was discovered, Mrs. Turner, mother of the man accused of the crime, came to her house in a greatly excited condition, and made the following statement: "He arose Sunday morning and kindled the fire, which he was not in the habit of doing. He then filled the coal box with enough fuel to last all day. This done, he took the sofa to the leading to the coal cellar, and lay on it all day, glaring and gnashing his teeth, and occasionally peering into the cellar. On Monday morning, the mother came downstairs, and found her son lying on the sofa. She found a bundle there, and on touching it, discovered that it contained a human body. Her shrieks brought her son hurriedly to the spot. It was a terrible sight, and she was unable to describe it. She saw that he looked and acted like a maniac, and she was afraid he would kill her. She begged him to spare her life. Finally he grew somewhat calmer, and she drew her knees and brought him to tell her the contents of the bundle and explain the mystery. This he suddenly refused to do, but later he confessed that he had committed murder, and showed her the corpse of the little girl. He then made his mother swear to say nothing about the matter, and to help him to dispose of the corpse. The body being not to be offensive, and Mrs. Turner brought some chloride of lime and applied it to the body. She then placed the mutilated remains in a tin box, and at night conveyed the ghastly burden to the place where it was found. Having told her story, Mrs. Turner implored her friend and benefactor, Mrs. Cotterill, to tell her what to do. Mrs. Cotterill insisted that she should inform the police of the facts, to which Mrs. Turner replied: "If it was a son of yours you would not advise his betrayal." After that Mrs. Cotterill wrote to the police anonymously. Since that time the mother has partly confessed the facts, and her story agrees substantially with
