## Congdon is **Now Dictator**

Appointed Coadjutor of Yuken Commissioner With Power to Graft.

Chief Justice Hunter and Mr. Campbell Sweeney are Commissioners.

TTAWA, June 3.—Although W. W. B. McInnes is commissioner of the Yukon, Mr. Congdon is to be virtually dictator in the territory. He is appointed legal advisor to the commissioner with a seat in the council. He is accorded the right of private practice and retains the government patronage. The government's action will lead to severe criticism on the part of the opposition, as, in effect, this particular appointment puts every man in the Yukon at Congdon's mercy.

Owing to the pressure of government business, the order-in-council appointing the British Columbia fisheries commissioner has not yet passed, but will be some day next week. The commission will be composed of Chief Justice Hunter and Campbell Sweeny, manager of the Bank of Montreal, Vancouver, Prot. It is expected that the state of Washington will appoint a similar commission, and that joint conferences will be held, but it has been decided not to constitute the two parties into an international commission.

ASHINGTON, D. C., June 3.—
An important conference was held at the White House this afternoon, the participants besides the President being Secretary of hesides the President being Secretary of the Navy Morton and Attorney General Moody. It related to the arrival today at Manila of the Russian cruisers Aur-ora, Oleg and Jemtchug, which were re-vorted to have been sunk by the Japan-ese fleet. The three ships were damag-ed, but were able to proceed under their own steam.

Rear Admiral Train, in command of the United States squadron now at Manila, having heard rumors of the sighting of Russian warships near the island of Luzon, made an investigation with his squadron and discovered the damaged cruisers making their way to port. The United States vessels, after an exchange of salutes with Admiral Enquist, in command of the Russians, escorted the three vessels to Manila.

In the present circumstances, vessels of either of the belligerent nations would be permitted to remain at a neutral portonly 24 hours, or if the ships were unseaworthy, only long enough to enable them to make the necessary repairs, in order that they might reach their nearest port.

Manilla, June 3.—Rear Admiral Enquist, who was commander of the heavy cruiser squadron of the Russian fleet, arrived in the bay at 9 o'clock this evening on board his flagship, the protected cruiser Aurora, accompanied by the protected cruisers Oleg and Jemtchug.

Nelson, B. C., June 2.—(Special)—An important strike is reported from Gold Hill, near Poplar, upon the Grey Horse, which is within about four miles of Poplar, and is within 2½ miles of the railway. # To Relieve Suspense

Russia Appeals to France to Secure News of Missing Men.

Great Indignation at Manner in Which 8hips Were 8urrendered.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 2.—In order to relieve the suspense of thousands of families, Russia has appealed to France to secure through the French minister at Tokio the most complete list possible of the Russian officers and men who perished or were saved. The fate of hundreds will never be known.

St. Petersburg is full of rumors of the most contradictory character regarding prospects of peace, but in the best informed quarters the Associated Press was told that no definite decision had been reached. Nevertheless it is persistently reported that an imperial manifesto may be expected shortly.

This manifesto will proclaim the immediate convocation of a national assembly, to which the question of peace or war will be submitted, thereby shifting the burden of a decision from the shoulders of the Emperor to the whole nation, robbing agitators of the opportunity to make revolutional capital out of the decision.

Resentment at Surrenders.

Resentment at Surrenders.

According to the despatch from Baron Ferzen, the commander of the cruiser Izumrud, the battleships remaining in the fight were still in squadron formation when he was cut off, and this increases the deep resentment felt here at the surrender of the ships, the Novoe Vremya even declaring that officers ought to be court martialed and shot for hauling down their flags and turning over their ships to the Japanese. The paper cites articles of the naval regulations forbidding a commander to surrender except as a last emergency, after taking measures to destroy his ship. The report from Lieut. Dournovo, of the torpedo boat destroyer Bravi, telling how that boat was disabled on the first day of the fight, and limped to Vladivostok through the midst of a hostile flotilla of destroyers, being obliged to even burn her wooden fittings to reach the harbor, awakens satisfaction, and though the Izumrud failed to reach Vladivostok, her destruction by her own crew is regarded with almost equal pleasure. The gaddest note for St. Petersburg was bruck by the destruction of the battleship Alexander III., which was manned by sailors of the Guard, and officered exclusively by men prominent in society and court. Her crew served during the winter time as a regiment of the Guard of which the Dowager Empress was honorary commander.

EFFECT OF SULTAN'S ACTION. Paris Bourse Adversely Affected by

Paris June 3.-Prices on the B today were heavy owing to the action of the Sultan of Morocco in the French reform propositions. The attempt on the life of the King of Spain caused further depression. At the close stocks had a slightly upward tendency. Russian imperial fours were quoted at 87.55 and Russian bonds of 1904 at 500. The private rate of discount was 1% per cent.
