BOYS' CAMP AT NEW MILLS Large Number of Boys From Cleveland Will Camp at this Lovely Site

Dalhousie, N. B., April 15.—Two letters received last week from Cleveland's East Technical High School professors by the Restigouche Vice-President for the N. B. Tourist and Amusement Association, confirm beyond a doubt the fact that the summer of 1924 will see New Mills, Restigouche Co., N. B. added to the list of summer resorts, of which there are many on the North Shore of N. B. and on the Quebec side of the Restigouche River and Bay of Chaleur.

That New Mills, is to be a busy spot during the month of July and the best part of August, when several hundred boys, accompanied by several professors, will spend eight weeks of holidays, enjoying the many summer outdoor advantages, where boys will get the most benefit, is now assured by the following, which is an exact copy of a very pretty folder, which has been handed to your correspondent, and which is called "Camp Chaleur for Boys."

"The problem of the day—where to send the boy to broaden his experience and energize his activities under proper guidance. It is solved by Camp Chaleur for Boys, located half way between Montreal and Halifax, at the Northern Boundary of New Brunswick. This beautiful camp is cradled on Bay Chaleur, a salt water bay 170 miles long making out to the Gulf of St. Lawrence. The trip to this vast land of explorations by land and sea is an education of itself and full of exciting and thrilling experiences for a boy.

During a recent visit from Lord Byng, Gov. General of Canada, accompanied by Lady Byng, on tour the Maritime Provinces, they acclaimed this location one of the most wonderful spots visited during their trip, and their special train was laid off several days that their party might linger to enjoy it.

The country is unsurpassed for hikes up the many rivers and to the midland lakes. The boys pitch camp with all its attendant joys and learn the fascinating art of fly fishing for speckled trout which abound in these lakes and streams—shoot—"with their cameras" at the moose and deer as they wander down to the waters edge for food and drink; follow the unusual opportunity for the alluring study of birds, woodcraft and nature lore; and vary it all with a taste of deep sea fishing under the care of experienced native fishermen.

Directly at Camp Chaleur is a Government Salmon Pool, an unfailing source of interest with its hundreds of salmon. Here the salmon are kept during the summer months and in the fall the eggs are taken for the Government Fisheries to restock the nearby streams.

The Camp site consists of 4800 feet of shore frontage with its beach and its groves of balsam and spruce trees, its splendid baseball grounds, athletic field and tennis court. There is a large 150 foot long dormitory and recreation hall and in a separate building is the dining hall and extra rooms and a large kitchen where an experienced chef prepares the best of foods—for the boys know what it is to be genuinely hungry in this invigorating salt air mingled with the fragrance of balsam and spruce.

At Camp Chaleur, a boy chooses from day to day the particular recreation that appeals to him personally always under the guidance of his Counselor; for the Counselors, who are high type college men, experienced in guiding boys, are their constant companions. The training in athletic is usually efficient, as


