Dalhousie, N. B., April 15.—Two letters received last week from Cleveland's East Technical High School professors by the Restigouche Vice-President for the N. B. Tourist and Resources Association, confirm beyond a doubt the fact that the summer of 1924 will see New Mills, Restigouche Co., N.
