LOCAL NEWS PARAPHRASED.

New helmets have been distributed to the firemen. A Sunday school room is being added to the Parkdale Methodist church. The police magistrate set a bankrupt new baby up in business yesterday.

The Sanitary Journal commences its sixth volume this month. It is an excellent periodical of the kind. Robbers went through the convent school in Bond Street Wednesday night, stealing two clocks and other articles.

An accident happened to the gas of the National club last night, and the plumbers had to be called in and the supply cut off. A woman was knocked down by a Newfoundland dog on Toronto street yesterday. Her left ankle was sprained and her head cut.

The old Yorkville firemen have voted a set of pictures presented to the brigade by a committee of the Yorkville council to the late chief, Mr. Robinson. Mr. Commissioner Kerr remarked the other day that "74 jury" is at times the most incompetent tribunal known to the law of England."

The whisky war has struck the town hard this week. The police report an unusually large number of arrests for drunkenness. Last night there were four teen. The bursting of a water pipe on Sherburne street near Dufferin has rendered the west end track in an abominable state, the mud and water being a couple of inches thick.

A Colborne man intends to bring an action for \$10,000 against the Toronto street railway company as compensation for injuries received owing to the alleged neglect of a conductor. Second Annual Tournament of the National Rod and Reel Association. New York, Oct. 16.—The first day's contests of the second annual tournament of the National Rod and Reel Association resulted as follows: The points to count in the first contest were the actual distance cast, accuracy in striking with the tail fly on an object placed in the water, and delicacy in casting. The second contest was a 15 foot distance in the water. A. C. Thorne of Central Valley N.Y., took the first prize by a score of 115 points. The actual distance in which his line reached was eighty feet, the rod used being 4 feet 6 inches long and 8 3/4 ounces in weight. The next trial, which was a 15 foot distance in the water, was won by W. E. Henke with 43 extra points. C. A. Ranch scored 100 points in all, and Thomas Pritchard 105. In class C, distance 15 feet, Thomas Pritchard scored 83, T. C. A. Ranch 70, and E. L. Eggert 64. The last contest was won by W. Henke. His best cast was 85 feet, followed by R. C. Leonard with 79 and T. J. Conroy with 67. The total of the points were respectively 120, 114, and 107. The casting, for heavy and light bass and salmon will be continued tomorrow.
