

THE INTERNATIONAL SOLD.

A SIX-LEAGUE LEAGUE IS NOW ASSURED.

Begining, Bay City and Buffalo Post their...
The New Clubs Are Very Enthusiastic.
President Mills Talks-Toronto After Her Players.

The International League is now an established fact. Bay City-Regina were reluctant about putting their guarantee but their money on hand all the same. Representative Reynolds stated that it was with considerable hesitation and difficulty they had entered the league and they understood that a guarantee from them would not be required. However, they were finally convinced that it would not be money wasted and handed over \$1000 to Secretary White. The Messrs. Ryan posted their guarantee without any hesitation.

It was not until 10 p.m. that the delegates convened to receive the report of the Schedule Committee. The difficulty of compiling this document was an account of the six clubs, necessitating much more difficult than in an eight-club circuit. The schedule was then not considered complete and the meeting decided to adjourn until to-day. All the representatives were satisfied with the outcome and so expressed themselves. It was with considerable relief that President Mills' statement was received that he had always been loyal to the International.

At Five With Baseball Men.
The Rosin House was alive with baseball men all day long. As stated yesterday, four delegates arrived Monday. They were Messrs. Hobbs, London, Fessenden, London, Leidy, Detroit, and J. L. Bacon, Boston. All the representatives were on hand early yesterday morning. The general secretary, Mr. C. D. White of Utica, unpacked his suitcase of documents and was ready for business. Of course nothing could be done until a schedule was made. Messrs. Fessenden and Leidy had been at work nearly all night. When the World's young man left Monday they had their sleeves rolled up toiling hard, and at noon yesterday they had apparently made no advance. Secretary White and Director McPherson also had a hand at it. Detroit, Hamilton and Toronto are the nominal schedule makers and their representatives worked with an executive creditable to those gentlemen.

The Bay City-Saginaw delegation were four in number, united and full of enthusiasm. These places are only eight miles apart and keen rivalry in everything from a match at marbles to a horse race; from competition in milling, etc., to making straws. But on baseball they are united. Mr. W. A. Pettapiece, the president of the club, belongs to Bay City and holds an important municipal position. Messrs. King and Reynolds are prominent citizens and members of the Baseball Board. Half of the games will be played in one and half in the other city. Saginaw has one of the best grounds in the country while Bay City's will be much improved this season. These places have great reputations in diamond affairs. It was Bay City that discovered the talents of the renowned John G. Clarkson. Saginaw was twice champion of the Northern League and last year held the State League championship.

Buffalo and the Brotherhood.
Buffalo was added to the league in the two Ryans, James and William-who by the way, are not relatives but jolly good fellows. James owns the Buffalo amateur grounds and will be the manager of the Buffalo team. William is a capitalist, fond of baseball and glad to welcome the International.

"Why," said the former Mr. Ryan, "we will be favorites. Buffalo has been two months. The novelty of seeing Stan, Kelly, Clark and Ward, and seeing them play when the local players are being dragged over the earth and our first-class international team is holding its own with the rivals. Yes, we will have a strong team; in fact we must have a strong team. The World asked President Mills of the Detroit and also of the League what he thought of the six-club league and he said: "We will have a good, strong league and plenty of interest. The Detroit team, in Detroit; yes, too strong, and will transfer some of our players to Bay City and Buffalo." Continued Mr. Mills in a grateful manner: "No, we never intended leaving the International. That was what we wanted. Several cranks and newspaper talk at home.
