The Duke had been dead several hours before the public was informed of it. Then the news came in the form of this authorized announcement in The Times:

"We regret to learn that the Duke of Bedford has died at his town residence, St. Eaton Square, the primary cause of his death heing congestion of the lungs. His Grace's illness has been of short duration, but very acute. He returned to town from Woburn Abbey, Bedfordshire, in November last. The unusually severe weather since that time rendered his health very indifferent and precluded him from returning to Bedford, shire to spend the Christmas holidays. Although slightly indisposed has tweek, it was not until Friday that any serious symptoms were developed. Dr. Gibbons of Cadogan Place, Sloane-street, had been in attendance upon His Grace for an apparent cold from which he had been suffering and which affected his lungs, and he was coafined to his bed. The disease increased in severity and the Duke lingered until 10 o'clock yesterday morning, when he passed peacefully away."

At the time that this announcement was given to the public at least three persons here with whom he had conferred, and Dr. Gibbons, who had attended the case. The Coroner adhered to the law in one respect. He summoned a jury and held a legal inquest. He is a blacksmith doing business near the late Duke's residence, and to whom a large sum of money would be a consideration. His wife said to-day that if her husband had served on such a jury be had never told her about it. The names of the other jurymen cannot be procured. An inquiry at Dr. Gibbons' house to-day revealed the fact that he also had left town for several days. A search at the police station of the district shows that the police had received no official information that the Duke had died from other than natural causes. than natural causes.

Within five hours after the coroner's jury had sat upon his body it was roasting in the retort of the crematory, in accordance, it is said, with the last wishes of the Duke.

In the Duke of Bedford's case this sermark is brought directly home.

It is almost inhuman to say that any man's suicide is received with a feeling of public satisfaction, but in the Duke of Bedford's case this is strictly true. With at least half a million of people living in London there probably never was any landlord more cordially hated by his tenants, whom he harnssed with an amount of tyranny that is not approached by any landlord in the distressed districts of oppressed Ireland. The Duke of Bedford owned the entire Covent Garden districts and Bloomsbury district, which lies between Trafalgar-square and Euston-station.

The Duke of Bedford was probably the richest Duke in England, his fortune even exceeding that of the Duke of Westminister; yet he power was known to listen to any appeal for elemency from tradesman or tomant who was crushed by his burdensome rent. He was as tenacious as any fondal baron and exacted every Lartning, no matter whether it drove the tenant to pauperism.


