The critics try to make much of the symbolism of the play. Like all great works of the imagination that are destined to live in literature, "The Master Builder" is wonderfully suggestive; and it throws strong lights on many problems of life; but if the reader will try to understand Ibsen's flesh-and-blood characters he will derive more benefit from them than in probing the author's secondary and more recondite meanings.
