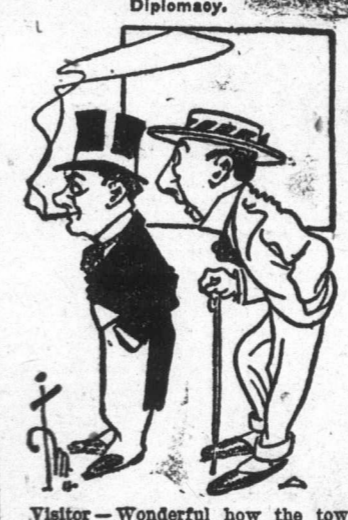
NOT LIKE OTHER GIRLS.

Professor C. A. Zavitz, of the O. A. C., at the Winter Fair, called attention to the new variety of alfalfa. This new variety is supposed to be from a cross with a wild plant. The new seed produces a plant very much harder than the common variety, which comes often from plants grown in a more southern climate. Tested at the O. A. C. this new variety has proved very hardy and a better yielder than the old variety. Northern grown seed of this variety should be secured for this section. Alfalfa, where a suitable subsoil is found, is the very best clover for winter feeding of cattle either for milk or beef.
