ROBBINS A FORMER PASTOR CONDUCTS CHURCH SCHOOL IN HIS CONGREGATION AT ROSLINDALE The Roslindale Baptist Church will conduct a vacation church school for the four weeks from June 29th to July 23rd, it was announced by the Pastor, the Rev. Clyde W. Robbins. The classes will be held for two hours and a half, from 9 to 11 o'clock every morning from Monday to Friday. The curriculum will include the study of the Bible, memorizing of choice selections, presentations of pagans, handwork, music, patriotic exercises and a varied social programme. The faculty of the school will comprise volunteers among the older members of the congregation. In his announcement of the plans for the school, Mr. Robbins described the church school as the institution through which the great task of religious education is best performed. He stressed the particular need of the denominations for as just such a school as he will begin in his church "as a matter of fact," he said, "the average Protestant child is receiving only about 13 hours of definite, specific religious instruction each year. The same child is receiving 1000 hours a year in secular instruction." The estimated cost of the school will be \$200. To defray this expense a special offering will be asked of the church on Children's Day, the day on which the enrollment of the boys and girls of the school will be made. Chief Inspector Standard Bank For Two Provinces Dies at Calgary Home. Many of our readers will read with deep regret the following, which we take from the "Calgary Daily Herald" of Tuesday, June 23rd. Robert H. Hoyt, chief inspector of the Standard Bank in Alberta and Saskatchewan, died suddenly from heart trouble at his residence, 513 Eighteenth avenue west, on Monday evening. The late Mr. Hoyt was born at Bridgetown, N. S., 36 years ago. He enlisted with the 62nd Battalion, Edmonton, in 1915, and served with the 21st Battalion overseas. Since returning to Canada he has risen rapidly in the service of the bank and was the centre of a wide circle of friends. The late Mr. Hoyt was a member of Christ Church, Anglican, Elbow Park. He is survived by his widow and two small daughters, Charlotte, aged 8, and Helen aged 5. He is also survived by his mother, who resides in California; two sisters, Mrs. Salisbury, of Long Beach, and Mrs. Goddard, of Vancouver, and three brothers, two of whom reside in British Columbia. The funeral arrangements are being made by Armstrong's funeral home and the details of the services will be announced later. The funeral will leave Armstrong's funeral home on Thursday morning, and will go to Christ Church, Elbow Park, where, at 9 o'clock, Rev. Canon Horne will conduct the service.
