War. Index the British forces practically at a standstill. England and the whole British Empire are wonderlug what will be the next move in the game. The entire force of a magnificent British Army is held at bay by an inferior force of Boors splendidly equipped for defonsive warfare and clinest mossaliable behind their rocky coverts. This seems to be the position that has produced such astemding results. For the past week it was known that General Buller had made a third attemp to force his way to made a third attemp to force his way to Ladysmith, then that he had retired to Ladysmith, then that he had retried to his former position south of the Tugola. Speculation as to the meaning and purpose of this retreat was rife. The war office was silent. Some put on it the worst construction; some the best. It was due to defeat; it was only a feint to mask an attack in another quarter or to hide a plau aimed at a quick advance upon Bloomfontein, the capital of the Orango Free State. 9.—"It was necessary after scizing Vaal
Krantz to cutrenoh it as the pivot of
further operations. But I found after further operations. But I found after two days that, owing to the nature of the ground, this was impracticable. It was also exposed to the fire of heavy guns in positions from which our attillery was dominated. It is essential to troops advancing on Ladysmith by Harding or Mongersdritt to hold Vaal Krantz securily, and accordingly we are not pressing the advance by those roads, as I find we cannot make it secure."

Whatwer plan of operations from the south or west of the Orange Free State may be tried, the road to Ladysmith seems to be blocked.
