

Brigadier-General E.M. Ryan, Provost Marshal General, United States Army; Lt. Colonel Edward Davison and Lt. Colonel R.H. Rogers of the United States Army, visited Canada during February to consult with Canadian officials concerning the programme of segregation and re-education of German prisoners-of-war.

(E) APPOINTMENTS AND CHANGES IN THE CANADIAN EXTERNAL SERVICE

Mr. H.L. Kenney, Canadian Ambassador to Mexico, came to Ottawa for consultation at the end of January.

On February 6 Mr. John R. Reid, Legal Adviser, who was in London as a delegate to the first session of the General Assembly of the United Nations, was elected to the International Court of Justice. Judge Reid returned to Ottawa at the end of the month for a short stay before going to The Hague.

The following members of the service who were in London attending the initial session of the General Assembly of the United Nations returned to their posts during February: Mr. Hume Wrong, Associate Under-Secretary of State for External Affairs; Mr. L.D. Wilgress, Canadian Ambassador to the U.S.S.R.; Mr. Pierre Dupuy, Canadian Minister to the Netherlands; Mr. C.S.A. Ritchie, Ottawa.

Mr. Scott Reid has returned to the Department in Ottawa after spending the past six months in London where he was one of the Canadian representatives on the Executive Committee of the United Nations, and later adviser to the Delegation to the Preparatory Commission and to the General Assembly of the United Nations.

Mr. E.H. Norman has returned to the Department in Ottawa. Last August Mr. Norman went to Manila to make arrangements for the repatriation of Canadian civilians from the Far East. Subsequently he was appointed Canadian representative on the Far Eastern Commission on its visit to Japan.

Mr. Roy Geddes has been appointed to the staff of the Canadian Military Mission to the Allied Control Council in Germany as representative of the Department of Trade and Commerce and Reconstruction and Supply.

Mr. C.A. Ranning has been appointed First Secretary at the Canadian Embassy in Chungking.

Mr. P.H. Morin, Vice Consul at the Canadian Consulate General in New York City, has been transferred to the Consulate in Lisbon, Portugal in the same capacity.

Mr. R.A.D. Ford who was one of the advisers to the Canadian delegation to the General Assembly of the United Nations, has been assigned temporarily to the staff of the High Commissioner in London.

Transfers of Third Secretaries during February included the following: C.A. Reid from Ottawa to the High Commissioner's Office in Australia; F.T. Moison from Ottawa to the High Commissioner's Office in the United Kingdom; T.H. Carter to the Canadian Embassy, Brussels.
