MACKENZIE RIVER SYSTEM—ALLOCATION OF USE—SUG-GESTED MEETING WITH PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENTS AND REFERENCE TO STANDING COMMITTEE

Mr. G. W. Baldwin (Peace River): I have a question for the Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development. Notice was taken by his Parliamentary Secretary of the question I asked last Wednesday, which involved several departments, but since the minister was in Yellowknife recently, and knows the facts, I am putting it to him. Will the minister assure the House that he will immediately convene a meeting with the governments of Alberta, British Columbia and Saskatchewan to deal with the use of the waters of the entire Mackenzie River system, having in mind the imminent danger which threatens and the fact that by next spring the need to allocate the use of these waters will arise? Will the minister tell us whether he is now willing to have this question referred to a standing committee for discussion some time in the new year, as I have suggested to him?

STATIONING OF SEARCH AND RESCUE VESSEL IN SYDNEY AREA

Mr. Robert Muir (Cape Breton-The Sydneys): My question is directed to the Minister of Transport, Mr. Speaker. Is the minister in a position to inform me of the latest developments in response to the urgent necessity for a search and rescue vessel being stationed in Sydney Harbour or its vicinity?

Hon. Donald C. Jamieson (Minister of Transport): I am delighted to be able to tell the hon. member that the coastguard vessel Wood is now being renovated and crewed, and as soon as she has been fully equipped she will be placed in the search and rescue service in the general area of the gulf. The matter of where she will be stationed will be determined after we have decided where the vessel can best be employed, but she will be stationed wherever it is demonstrated it is best for her to be.

Mr. Muir: Is the minister aware that thousands of men who go to sea, as well as their families, have been waiting for this announcement for a long time? Is he also aware that his two predecessors ignored the pleas put forward by myself—
