**Question No. 169—Mr. Forrestall:**

1. How much has been spent by the government on harbour development at Gros Cacouna?
2. In what years were such expenditures made and in what amounts?
3. What was the purpose of the expenditures and to what extent were they successful?

**Mr. Ralph E. Goodale (Parliamentary Secretary to President of the Privy Council):** I am informed by the Department of Public Works and Transport Canada as follow: 1. \$8,819,333.91.

2. 1960-61, \$45,000.00; 1961-62, \$17,136.49; 1962-63, \$29,998.19; 1963-64, \$6,826.85; 1964-65, \$240,998.57; 1965-66, \$2,288,310.45; 1966-67, \$1,537,357.11; 1967-68, \$3,559,574.52; 1968-69, \$1,068,021.00; 1969-70, \$19,110.82; 1970-71, \$2,381.19; 1971-72, \$4,618.72.

3. The purpose of the expenditures was to provide the basic harbour infrastructure for a deep water harbour at Gros Cacouna site. This work was completed satisfactorily.
